Harry G. Short of St. John, N. B. had a very successful season with his free-legged pacing mare, **John Henry**, 2:13 by the former Grand Circuit star and excellent Ontario sire Peter Henley 2:02. She started in six races last year, had two wins, one at Sussex via the straight front route and the other at Sackville August 17th, with the same placing, 1-1-1, and also lowered her record from 2:14 to 2:13 there. She placed second at Amherst, winning the first heat, second at St. John winning one heat, second at Moncton winning one heat and fourth in her final start at St. John. We confess we always liked this mare and remember Joe O'Brien speaking about her a year ago after her race at St. Stephen. Joe thought she would be a 2:10 pacer eventually and we hope she will.

During 1901-02 he was a member of the Abbie senior team whose games with the old Victoria and Summerside Crystals were always remembered by all old-time hockey fans.

He left the Abbies to play with the New Glasgow Silver Black Foxes in 1903, and was ranked the fastest skater in that semi-professional league.

As a member of the New Glasgow team he played an exhibition game with a Montreal team at that time holders of the Stanley Cup, when Williams drew rave notices from Montreal writers on his performance. True, the New Glasgow team was beaten rather handsily by the Upper Canadian representatives, but Williams' fast skating proved to be a very outstanding feature.

His passing will be regretted keenly by all who had the privilege of playing against him; he was a sportsman of the highest type and the many fans who had watched him in the zenith of his career will deeply mourn his death.

To his wife, his children, and brothers and sister in this city this column takes this opportunity of extending sincere sympathy in the passing of not only a former much-beloved athlete in Island circles but also of one who made his mark when playing away from home.

Old time hockey players and fans, and there are still many left, were saddened in yesterday's news despatch to hear of the passing of Jimmy Williams, former Abegweit hockey player of Charlottetown between the years 1888 to 1902.

Williams broke in as a Junior Abbie in the old Agricultural Hall on Fitzroy St. in 1898. Dark-thatched and very fast, Jimmy in those early days gave promise of the stardom that was to come to him in later years.

In 1900 in company with players such as Sammy Doyle, Byron Brown, Jimmy Mustek, Jack McLean, George Jost, Art Worth and several others, he graduated into intermediate ranks and his fast skating made him one of the most outstanding in intermediate circles.

HUNTERS' CORNER



Since the New Year of 1947 came in there has only been a few days that were fit to hunt rabbits, furthermore foxes were able to do their mousing in the grassy swales and uncut hay-fields as usual, and as a consequence the white bunnies have had somewhat of a break since January ushered in. Once the fields become covered with deep crusty snow the foxes spend most of their time in the woods and swamps hunting rabbits.

The little white wraiths are plentiful this winter and some splendid sport was had by those who follow the beagles and rabbit hounds all through the month of December. I know of two of them who went out with two hounds on an afternoon between Christmas and New Years and shot 27 rabbits in a little over three hours. It was nothing unusual to see as many as three rabbits running ahead of the hounds when they crossed an open space.

This plentifulness of rabbits does not apply to every woods. One may sometimes travel for quite a distance without seeing more than the odd rabbit track and then suddenly walk into a section of woodland where the snow is padded down hard by the passage of many flying feet. An ideal setup for a lot of fast action and excitement is a string of small swamps with short open spaces between that the bunnies have to cross to get from one cover to the other. With a couple of good hounds one can burn up a lot of ammunition in a short time in a setup like this.

Rabbits are very prolific and are regarded as one of nature's standbys in keeping meat eating predators supplied with food. Besides they furnish us humans with plenty of health giving sport at a time when other species of game have either moved on to the sunny south or are on the protected list.

The first litters are born early in April ranging in number from two to four. I have come across young rabbits lying in a hastily made form on top of a dry cradle, in the woods when all around was snow a foot or more deep. One rabbit raises several litters in a year and the young of the April litters are known to raise young in the late summer of the year in which they were born. No wonder they can stand up to so much punishment the year 'round.

The flesh of the rabbit is tender and resembles chicken in flavour and whether stewed, fried or roasted it makes a tasty and appetizing dish. Some prefer them roasted in the oven after being stuffed with dressing.

Chicago Appears Out Of Race For The Stanley Cup

The National Hockey League race has not yet reached the two-thirds mark of its 60-game schedule but unless a modern miracle occurs you can scratch Chicago Black Hawks off the list of contenders for the Stanley Cup next March.

One of the hottest teams in last season's play, the Hawks are mired at the bottom of the heap after playing 26 games, three notches below their place in the six-team standing in March, 1945.

Just what has happened to the team which Bill Tobin purchased for \$300,000 last fall isn't quite clear.

Some of the most-critical supporters of the Indians are howling for the scalp of Johnny Gottselig but those on the inside know the Regina Russian is one of the keenest mentors in the business. When his team started to crack he drained his farm clubs and scouted the amateurs, but nothing seems to help.

In 38 games, the Hawks have gathered only 11 wins and two ties for 24 points. Mathematically they can still make the playoffs, for they are only 11 points behind the fourth-place New York Rangers and have three games in hand. Fourth place is all they need to reach the extra-money brackets but the Hawks show signs of growing weaker instead of stronger.

Marshall Gowing, Moncton, is one of the mainstays of harness racing in that vicinity. About a year ago he bought the Island-bred pacing mare Lady Hal 2:11 1/2 by Sempson Hal 2:02. Now he has look back on having made a good choice as Lady Hal won three races in 1946, two at Sackville, N. B., and one at Sussex, and stepped one of her heats in the Marlton in 1946-2:06 1/2. Mr. Gowing mentioned that he saw Lady Hal being exercised last week and she was really a picture mare and he predicts 2:10 for her.

He also had the pleasure of looking through his stable. He is wintering Mike Volo and George B. Gay's McKillop Cash 2:02. The latter has filled out as a real super in superb condition. It will be remembered that McKillop Cash was one of the trio to step the fastest mile paced or trotted in the Marlton in 1946-2:06 1/2. Mr. Clarke is giving McKillop Cash lots of miles and barring accidents our friend believes he should make a great showing this year.

The change in the eligibility classifications made by the United States Trotting Association which go into effect this year have, perhaps, not been realized by a great many of our horsemen friends. In the past classes the change is really startling and as far as we can learn there is only one horse in the world in the Free For All class and it is Ensign Hanover 2:04. To be there he must have won over \$94,000. The trotter Titan Hanover will be placed in Class 2 and then there are no trotters in the intermediate classes until Class 5 is reached for non-winners of \$4,000. There are three of these—Chesterton 2:01 1/2, winner of the Hambletonian last August; Koala 2:02, winner of the Santa Anita \$50,000 trotting derby, and Victory Song 1:58 1/2, a large stake winner as a two and three-year-old. There are no Class 2, 3 or 4 pacers but Class 5, non-winners of \$40,000 has in it King's Counsel, 1:58, but as he is in the stud at Gainsway Farm he will not be racing this year. There are none in Class 6 but in Class 7 is Blue Again 2:02 1/2, winner of the \$50,000 pacing stake at Santa Anita last year.

While we do not claim that the information we give regarding lifetime horses is correct in detail, quite a few of them may have been overlooked by us, yet we will endeavor as far as we possibly can to give a list of the classes to which most of our horses are eligible with the trotting first, followed by the pacers.
