TORONTO — The local market weak and unchanged with dealers quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 40-45; firsts 45-50; seconds 30-32. MONTREAL — There are large supplies of British Columbia and American eggs on hand. Receipts from Ontario are still light but these eggs are jobbing extras 43, firsts 47; states fresh are jobbing 43-45. WINNIPEG — Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 48; firsts 46; seconds 35. Prices to retailers extras 53; firsts 51; seconds 45. REGINA — This market has opened as a result of lighter receipts following severe weather. Dealers now quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extras 47; firsts 45; seconds 40 and selling to retailers extras 60; firsts 58; seconds 50. Small express shipments are 48-52. CALGARY — There has been a sharp decline of receipts on this market owing to weather conditions and prices have advanced. Dealers now quoting country shippers extras 39; firsts 37; seconds 28. VANCOUVER — The market is unchanged firm with an increased demand in the prairies. Dealers are quoting producers extras 32; firsts 30; seconds 28. John Stirling, chairman of the committee on resolutions then submitted the following resolutions: These were read by Mr. W. E. Bentley and moved, seconded and carried unanimously: SALE OF INTOXICATING LIQUOR Moved by Rev. John Stirling. Seconded by George Brown, New Glasgow. WHEREAS the dehumanizing influence of alcohol knows no parallel: It induces deadening of normal parental emotions and of conscientiousness of duty and callousness to ordinary social opportunities and to the human obligations of life; It is used, even in moderate quantities, to disturb the healthy exercise of the mental faculties, impair the moral sense by unduly exciting the animal passions, and produces unfitness for the discharge of duties in the proper struggle for survival, and has the most injurious influence on health and life; It produces profound and too often permanent mental deterioration and instability; lowers resistance to infection of diseases, and is one of the most powerful factors in the propagation of tuberculosis; It affects disastrously the minds and bodies of innocent unborn children, lowering their normal reproductive power, and causing an impaired type of nervous system and mental deterioration; AND WHEREAS the latest and most authentic statistics show that over ten per cent of all mortality is due to the abuse of alcohol, and fully twenty per cent of all disease is due to this cause; and also that over fifty per cent of insanity, idiocy and pauperism spring from this source; and all authorities agree that from seventy-five to ninety per cent of all criminality is caused by the abuse of alcohol; AND WHEREAS it is the duty of the State to interfere and strive to improve the social habits of the community when these habits threaten to undermine national efficiency and vitality; THEREFORE RESOLVED, that we the members of the Prince Edward Island Temperance Alliance hereby pledge ourselves to an unwavering advocacy and support of all measures, Federal and Provincial, having for their object the prevention of the use of alcoholic liquor for beverage purposes; AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we hereby affirm our unrelenting opposition to the adoption of any system in this Province by which legal sanction might be given to the sale of intoxicating liquor for general consumption, or by which the Government might, for hope of financial gain therefrom, become engaged in the distribution of a product, so dangerous to our young people, and so terrible in its effects and consequences.

PROVINCIAL

WHEREAS certain of the Provinces of Canada have enacted what are known as "Government Control" Acts, having for their object the sale of liquor by the Government of those Provinces; AND WHEREAS under the said "Government Control" Acts of the said Provinces the sale of intoxicating liquors is permitted to be made by persons other than the Government or its Commission or its appointees—that is to say, by licensed tavern keepers, hotel keepers, restaurant keepers, grocery stores, clubs and other establishments; and railway dining cars and steamboats; AND WHEREAS, apart from the license fee payable by such licensees, the profits made from the sale of liquors by such tavern keepers, hotel keepers, restaurant keepers, store keepers, clubs and other licensees are not paid to the Government; AND WHEREAS under the Prohibition Act of this Province, all moneys received from the sale of liquors, whether wholesale or retail are received directly by the Government of this Province through its Commission, and no such moneys or profits are shared by any private individual; and for the control of the sale of liquor under the said Prohibition Act is much more effective and complete than could exist under any such "Government Control" Acts; AND WHEREAS the so-called "Government Control" Acts in intoxicating liquor may be sold without limit for beverage purposes, and not for medicinal purposes only; AND WHEREAS the most effective remedy for the detection and prevention of violations of the provisions of the Prohibition Act is the prohibition of Section 52, by which it is declared to be unlawful for any person to keep or have in possession any liquor which has not been lawfully purchased from a Vendor for medicinal or other purposes sanctioned by the Act. In prosecutions for offences against the provisions of the said Section 52, it is necessary to prove that the liquor was purchased from a Vendor for medicinal or other purposes sanctioned by the Act. AND WHEREAS since the enactment of the said Section 52 as part of the Prohibition Act, by far the greater number of convictions for violation of the Act have been secured under the remedial provisions of the said Section. In the year 1926 the proportion of the convictions obtained under the said Section 52 was seventy-five per cent of the total number of convictions for all violations of the Act. AND WHEREAS under the "Government Control" Acts permission is given for the purchase of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes at Government stores or shops, as well as at licensed grocery stores, hotels, taverns, summer resorts, clubs, banquets, dining rooms, restaurants, steamboats, and other licensed establishments, and such liquors may be consumed by the purchaser at or may remain in his possession for consumption at, many of such places. Liquor may also be kept in his own dwelling house, and, in violation of the provisions of the Prohibition Act relating to the giving of such certificates, a person may be granted such a certificate, either permanently or for a period as the Board may see fit. AND WHEREAS, previous to the passing of said Amendment, the Prohibition Act had declared that in determining the bona fides of the giving of such certificates, the fact that numbers of similar certificates have been given by such physician should be evidence against such bona fides; BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, by the Prince Edward Island Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance that the Board of Prohibition Commissioners be requested more closely to exercise the duty of supervision of such medical certificates imposed upon the Board by the Legislature by the said Amending Act, and that the Board do also exercise the said power of restriction as vested in them, so that the aim and policy of the Legislature as indicated in the said Statutes may be more effectively realized. It was then moved by W. E. Bentley and seconded by Ira McKay that the executive be empowered to employ an organizer to do work for the Alliance throughout the Province. This was carried unanimously.
