ORANGE WHIPPED CREAM PIE One and one-half cups orange juice, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, grated rind 1 small orange, 1 cup sugar, pinch salt, 2 small dessert-spoons cornstarch, 2 tablespoons butter, 3 eggs, yolks beaten separately from the whites, whipped cream. Mix sugar, salt, cornstarch and grated rind; add fruit juices and cook in double boiler 12 minutes, stirring. Beat egg yolks well, and add to the first mixture together with butter. Cook for 2 minutes and cool. Turn into a well coated, rich pie shell, and cover with sweetened and flavored cream. Serve cold. (You may use the egg whites for a soufflé of some sort.) This is delicious and nutritious and good for children as well as grown-ups.
