BIG MEN AND SMALL MEN.

It is stated on apparently good authority that in the armies now fighting in Manchuria two average sized Russian soldiers weigh as much as three average Japanese soldiers. And yet the little men have won every battle. The fact may serve to recall the saying of the little Colorado broncho buster—"When I am in a peaceful frame of mind I weigh only 130 pounds, but when I'm mad I weigh a ton!" Not that the Japanese are mad, but terribly in earnest. They are also well-armed, well-fed, well-trained, admirably commanded, with full confidence in their commanders, and in the justice of their cause. Such men are invincible. For the purpose of war each one of them possesses something much better than the Russian soldier's extra avoidupoise. The spirit that is regardless of death or wounds, enshrined in a small but active frame, trained to shoot straight and rapidly, to obey orders and to endure privations, the alert master of every muscle and faculty, makes the model soldier.

In one respect at least, when exposed to rifle or gun fire, the short little man has an actual advantage. Many a deadly bullet passes harmlessly over his head or over his shoulder which would have struck a more stalwart Russian to the ground if standing on the same spot. In like manner many a bullet or fragment of shell may pass close to his side which would have sorely wounded a broader man. In close battle and hand to hand struggles the athletic training, the quickness of movement and a knowledge of jiu jitsu tricks has made the Japanese soldier fully the equal of his heavier foe. As in the memorable duel between James Fitz James and Roderick Dhu, steady skill matched against greater physical weight and strength is still the victor.
