CURRENCIES

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(CP)—The Canadian dollar bettered the official selling rate of 10 cents set by the Dominion's Foreign Exchange Control Board, by ending 1-16 of a cent higher at a discount of 10 15-16 per cent at 99 1-16 cents in today's market, its best closing price since November, 1939. Only yesterday the Canadian currency had equalled the year's best rate of 11 per cent discount. A new 1941 high was set earlier in the day's trade when the Canadian unit touched 89.12 1-2 cents. Money dealers said the recent gains were due to seasonal demand of Canadian dollars by vacationists going to the Dominion. But they added that the market was so thin that a sale of \$10,000 could make the Canadian dollar fluctuate as much as 3-8 of a point. Ottawa Foreign Exchange Control Board rate 9.09-9.91 per cent discount. Other leading foreign currencies, including the pound sterling at \$4.03 1-2, were unchanged.
