ANOTHER MINE HORROR

PRIMERO, Colorado, Feb. 1.—More than one hundred men are believed to have been killed by a terrific explosion in Primero Mine. Eight bodies have been recovered, and rescue parties are making desperate efforts to reach the interior works, cut off from the outside by the caving in of the main shaft. Three men were killed at the mouth of the mine slope by the force of the explosion.

Both the fans with which the mine is equipped were shattered, and it is impossible to enter the mines until they are repaired.
