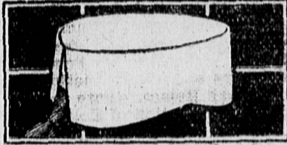

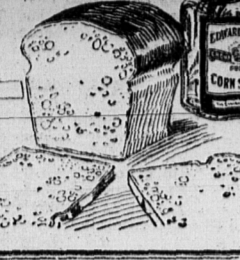

GERMANY'S PREDICAMENT

(Special to the Guardian)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—Official Washington's opinion of Bolsheviki Foreign Minister Trotsky's decision for no war and still no peace with Germany is that Trotsky, whether knowing it or not, has placed Germany in a military and diplomatic predicament.

Movement of German troops from the Russian front has been stopped and it is believed by military men here no further withdrawal of forces can be made until Berlin has decided on a policy toward the Bolsheviki. Such official reports as have been received do not say clearly whether demobilization of Russian troops has been continued, but they do indicate a re-organization of the Red Guard.

Germany by repudiating the non-annexation policy, officials here think has widened the breach with the socialists who cry for peace. They also think Germany will be forced to go to the aid of the Ukrainians if the Bolsheviki attack them.

INTERESTING TALK TO PUPILS.

Yesterday afternoon, Mr. F. J. Nash, delivered a most interesting and instructive address on the present Great War to the pupils of West Kent School. He emphasized the strength, resources, the genius of the British Empire and her Allies. He also referred to some of the stupendous undertakings accomplished by Great Britain and her Allies and declared that the complete overthrow of the Central Powers was merely a question of time. The address was much appreciated by the pupils and teachers who are always delighted to listen to Mr. Nash. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the learned lecturer, to which he happily replied.

NOTED AVIATOR COMING.—Mr. F. W. Hyndman has received telegraphic advice from the Canadian Division of the Aerial League of Empire, that Major Kennedy, the Commissioner to Canada and the United States in the interests of the Imperial Royal Flying Corps, England, will visit Charlottetown on 27th Feb. or 6th March, and exhibit lantern views if the League here provides a hall and lantern and screen. The Commission-er would make this visit most interesting. Yesterday afternoon the executive of the Aerial League, consisting of President F. W. Hyndman, Secretary O. C. Craswell and Messrs. P. R. Hearze, C. H. B. Longworth, A. E. Morrison and D. B. Stewart, met in Mr. Hyndman's office to consider the matter. As a result it was decided to invite Major Kennedy to the city to lecture in the Market Hall, on Wednesday, March 6th, and a telegram to that effect was forwarded last night.

"SANTA MARIA" AGAIN IN COURTS.—The ship "Santa Maria" is again before the Courts. Shortly after Dr. Leo Frank purchased the "Santa Maria" last fall at public auction when she was sold by the Marshall of the Admiralty Court, he removed the Columbus relics and placed them in one of the rooms of the Provincial Building for safe keeping. The Collector of Customs thereupon made a demand upon Dr. Frank to pay duty on these articles, or place them in a bonded warehouse under the control of the Department. Dr. Frank refused, and the Collector forced his way into the room where the relics were stored and seized them for Customs duties. Dr. Frank then made an application to the Admiralty Court, took out an Order upon the Collector of Customs "To show cause why he should not state and present to the Court the nature and amount of any claim for customs duties upon the Santa Maria and the articles on board, including the Columbus relics." The matter came up for argument before Judge Stewart, in the Admiralty Court, on January 23rd. Mr. J. D. Stewart, K.C., on behalf of the Crown, argued that the proceeding was not maintainable on the following grounds: 1. That there is no provision in the practice of the Exchequer Court for bringing up such a matter by affidavit and order. 2. That such a matter cannot be brought before the Court as part of or ancillary to another suit. 3. That this in a case against the Crown, as represented by the Minister of Customs, cannot be instituted without the consent of the Crown. Mr. Bentley, K.C. (Mr. J. Johnston, K.C., with him) argued in support of the application. The Court reserved judgment which was given yesterday, deciding that the second ground urged by Mr. Stewart was well taken. The application was dismissed. Messrs. Bentley, K.C., and Johnston, K.C., for Dr. Leo Frank, and Mr. J. D. Stewart, K.C., for the Department of Customs.

Major Stanley is still suffering from the effects of wounds received in the battle of Vimy Ridge when he won the D. S. O. He is now associated with Capt. T.
