## Feller Wins No. 9 Shutting Out Browns

NEW YORK, May 25—(AP)—Bob Feller pitched the pace-setters of the American League to a shut-out over the Browns today, getting 13 strikeouts, while Jeff Heath's dynamite-laden bat led the Indians' six-run attack at Cleveland.

That made it No. 9 for Feller, his second straight shut-out, five in a row for the Indians and a clean sweep of their three-game series with St. Louis.

At Detroit, young pitcher Hal Newhouse weakened in the seventh inning and started Chicago White Sox on a spree that gave them seven runs in one inning and a 7-3 victory over Detroit's Tigers.

A combination of three hits, three walks and an error produced the Chicago rally, and gave the Sox an even break in the four-game series. Lefty Grove had an easy time scoring his 206th lifetime victory at New York as Boston Red Sox whaled three Yankee pitchers for a 10-3 decision.

NEW YORK, May 25—(AP)—Paul Ranyan came from behind with a sub-par 69 on the seventh and final round to win the \$5,000 Goodall round-rbin golf tournament today. It was his first major victory since the P.G.A. Championship of 1933 and his first triumph of any kind since the Argentine Open in the fall of the same year.

"Little Poison," who tossed in his two best rounds when it would do him the most good, finished the 126 holes of the fourth annual Goodall Circuit 23 shots over par. In spite of that poor medal showing, he had a total of 26 plus points, representing the net number of holes he won in his 14 matches.
