**The latest news, first of all.**

All the principal stores in Summerside will be closed tomorrow, Victoria Day.

A. W. P. Gaurie returned on Friday last from a cod-fishing excursion to Malpeque.

In referring to the death of Wm. Dunn in Saturday's Guardian the name was incorrectly furnished as James.

Dealers in Alberton are paying thirty-eight cents a bus for white oats, thirty-nine cents for black, twenty cents a lb for butter sixteen cents a doz for eggs, ten cents a ton for pork eight and a half cents a lb for hides and eleven dollars a ton for pressed hay.

Summerside dealers are paying eighteen to twenty cents a bus for potatoes, ten dollars to ten fifty a ton for pressed hay, ten cents a ton for loose hay, seventeen cents a doz for eggs thirty-eight to forty cents for oats and ten to ten and a half cents a lb for pork.

W. and Mrs. McPherson, Elmsdale, have the sympathy of their many friends in the loss they have sustained by the death of their only son Basil aged eleven months. The funeral took place Sabbath afternoon, May 15th, and was conducted by the Rev. J. H. McHattie.

Trench is to have a building boom this summer. A number of new dwellings are to be erected. Philip Bernard, lately of Boston, is about to establish a wood-working factory there and it is also reported that an electric light plant will be installed in connection with this factory.

The 12th of July next from present indications will likely be one of the biggest days in the history of Summerside. The annual celebration of the Orange Lodge of P. E. I. will be held in Summerside and in addition to the usual large number of people from different parts of this Province about one thousand are expected from the mainland, especially from Westmoreland and Cumberland counties. As already announced at a meeting of the County Judges of both these counties held a few days ago it was unanimously decided to celebrate the 12th in Summerside and arrangements have already been made for a special trip of the Empress to bring over the crowd from Westmoreland county.

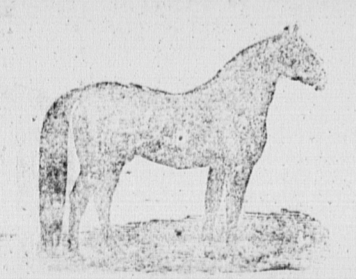
—Frank Snake, one of the oldest Indians in this Province, died at his home in Indian River on Monday evening last. Although his exact age is not known even to himself, he is said to have reached very near the century mark. Frank was a frequent visitor to Summerside and was known to almost everyone in the town. He was a typical Indian and one of the few remaining links connecting the past and the present. His funeral took place on Wednesday May 11, and was largely attended, not only by his white friends, but by his fellow braves on Lennox Island who came over in boats to be present at the funeral. The service was conducted in Indian River Chapel by the Rev. Mgr. Gillis. The choir of Indians singing the mass.

—It ought to have been mentioned earlier that among many other towns Alberton was deeply moved by King Edward's death. In a few minutes after the sad news arrived all the flags were placed at half mast, and some who had no flags procured or made new ones and hung them out to express their sense of sorrow. Over twenty flags were thus displayed. On the following day the worshippers in the Presbyterian Church found the edifice heavily draped in black and purple, the gallery choir gallery and pulpit being thus treated, and also His Majesty's portrait over the organ. Very impressive services were held in all the churches. A number of private residences bore emblems of the general sorrow. On the day of the King's funeral all the stores were closed and a solemn stillness pervaded the town.
