In the course of Major Bartlett's lecture on Venice, Monday evening the eighth inst, there will be shown a series of about fifty beautiful views, including the wonderful Cathedral of St. Mark, the ornate palace of the Doges, The Bridge of Sighs, the Rialto, and a great number of other interesting points.

Somewhere about thirty four years ago a steamer called the "Tunsball" loaded with coal was endeavoring to make her way through or around the ice in the gulf on her way to Montreal. When several miles off the Covehead Shore the wind came around to the north and drove the ice back upon the island shore with great velocity. The Tunsball and the bottom crushed her cargo of coal. The captain and crew saved their lives by means of their small boats and landed at Covehead or thereabouts. Next day they came to this City by train. Last summer pieces of coal resembling cakes of "Pears Soap" in shape, some much larger, were washed ashore and it is supposed that the good ship Tunsball has broken up thus liberating the pieces of coal which are now finding their way to the island shore.

There departed this life at his home Crossfield, Alberta, on the 14th Jan. J. A. Martin in the 67th year of his age. Deceased was a son of the late William Martin, Martinvale and was born in the Isle of Skye, Scotland. He emigrated to Prince Edward Island in 1862. Some years later he made his home in Rat Portage now Kenora, Ont., where he obtained a position as jail-keeper which he held for twenty-five years. On account of ill health he resigned, and accompanied by his wife moved as far west as Crossfield, Alberta, where she died soon after. The interment took place at Calgary the funeral service being conducted by the brothers of the Masonic Order of which he was a member for forty years. He leaves to mourn two sons John S. on the homestead and William F. at Fort William, also three sisters and two brothers. The sisters are Mrs. D. Nicholson, Mount Lehman, B. C., Mrs. Mabel McLeod, Wellington, Mass, and Mrs. William McPhee, Martinvale. The brothers are Martin and Alexander, Martinvale, P. E. I.
