ANNUAL RIFLE NEW HORSES MEET AUG. FOR CIRCUIT 1ST. AND 2ND. AT ST. STEPHEN

The 64th Annual Prize Meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association of Prince Edward Island, will be held on the Kensington Rifle Range, Charlottetown, on Thursday and Friday, August 1st and 2nd.

The rifle meet last year was held on Monday and Tuesday, but this year it has been changed to Thursday and Friday, so that on account of a wet day, Saturday will be available.

The prize list this year is practically the same as last year. There will be a few minor changes. On account of the small number of practice targets available, actually three in number, it is requested that all competitors get in as much early practice as possible.

Judging by the keen interest which is being taken in rifle shooting in all sections of the province, and the excellent showing which our riflemen have made in the Inter-Maritime and Ottawa shoots, it is expected this year will see the largest number of competitors of any year since the Great War.

Lt.-Colonel C. Leigh, V.D., Secretary of the Association, will be glad to give all information necessary to intending competitors at any time. The pamphlet containing the prize list and rules pertaining thereto, is in the printer's hands and will be published shortly.

STEPHEN, July 15.—(Special)—Maine and New Brunswick Circuit campaigners will have some additions to their lists when they race here this week in the third meeting of the season's campaign, including Bob Seymour, 2.05 1-2, which promises to be one of the contenders in the Junior Free-for-All, and the members of the stable owned by W. GOOD RACING AT AMHERST

AMHERST, July 14.—The first racing programme staged here in a period of two years brought together a great field and a series of fine performances were offered before a small crowd of patrons.

Considering the heavy footing, the track being deep with dust, the horses made excellent time and every heat in each class proved to be a horse race from wire to wire. Considering the short notice of the races, a good entry list was made up and various horsemen expressed the opinion that a record field could be assembled in Amherst with large attendance, providing sufficient notice was given.

Captain Mack, the Truro entry in the free-for-all, captured this event although pushed out in every heat by Hal Gentry, of Parrsboro. The Gentry horse finished second in every heat, but was set back in the second heat for swerving in the stretch.

Peter Alright, under the guiding hands of Tom Holmes, veteran colored driver, was on his best behavior during the afternoon, and although nosed out by Fernwood in the first heat of the 2.30 mixed class, came back strong and carried honors in the succeeding heats.

The Markets PRODUCE

MONTREAL, Que., July 15.—Spring wheat flour prices advanced 85c per barrel on the local grain market here today.

All other prices on the cash grain market was marked up substantially. A very strong demand for millfeed was reported. The local cheese market was very quiet. Wholesale prices were unchanged.

Receipts were 6,914 boxes compared with 5,488 boxes on the same day last week. The butter market was also very quiet. Wholesale prices were unchanged and retail prices were as follows: 39c per lb. for solids and 40c per lb. for prints.

The chief factor contributing to the dullness of the local market is said to be the lack of buying for storage purposes. Eggs were steady. Retail prices were as follows: Fresh extras 38c per dozen, fresh firsts 32 to 33c per dozen and fresh seconds 27 to 28c per dozen. Receipts were 1148 cases as compared with 3207 cases on the same day last week.

Old potatoes are no longer being offered for sale, the trade reports today. Montreal Island new potatoes were announced by wholesale jobbing houses in their prices for dressed poultry. Retail prices were: squab broilers 46 to 48c per lb., selected broilers 40 to 44c per lb., selected chickens, 38 to 45c per lb., milkfed chickens 43 to 48c per lb., selected gosling 30c per lb., selected ducks 32c per lb.
