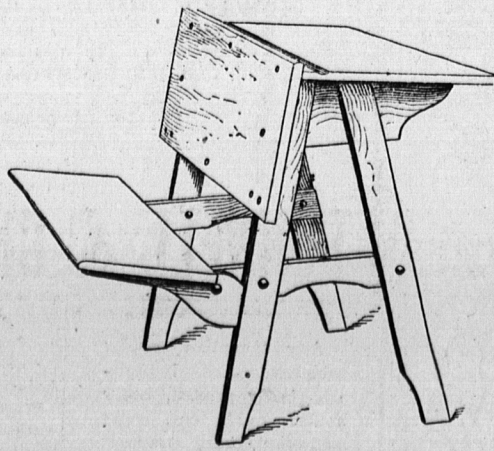

## ASIATIC IMMIGRATION AN ISLANDER'S VIEW.

Our readers have heard and read much about the influx of Japanese, Chinese and Hindoos into British Columbia and many of them will no doubt feel interested to know how it appears to an intelligent and observing man from this Province. We have before us a letter from Charles McD. McKinnon, now of Vancouver, B.C., who after some kindly references to the Guardian remarks upon the situation in regard to Asiatic immigration as follows: "Knowing that the Guardian is always a consistent advocate of justice, we would like to know that we had its sympathy in the present crisis in this Province caused by the thousands of ignorant Orientals who are being landed here to starve or compete with white labor. Though the treaty with Japan only allows one Jap per month to leave each of the forty Provinces for Canada, they are evading the spirit of the treaty and coming in by way of Honolulu instead of directly from Japan and already nearly 8,000 of them have arrived this year. Should Asiatic immigration continue, at even the present rate, in ten years the whites will be only one fourth of the population. This is certainly a serious outlook.

"Considerable dissatisfaction is felt in the prairie Provinces over the influx of so many Galicians. But after living near their settlement in Manitoba for eight or ten years I can say that they are desirable settlers when compared with the Japs, Chinks and Hindoos. "I am aware that the work of the Asiatic Exclusion League is being misrepresented far and wide by the capitalist class whose only object is to secure cheap labor to aid them in exploiting the natural resources of the country. The pastor of the church I attend, -Rev. H. W. Fraser D.D. is receiving abusive letters mostly anonymous from all quarters for the stand he takes in defence of a White Canada. Though a loyal Nova Scotian he is referred to as an American agitator from the fact that he spent some years in California. However, strong in the justice of the cause, "none of these things move him."

"Could the capitalists be satisfied with fair profits on their investments, they might leave fewer millions to be a curse to their children, but could feel that their business had been a benefit and not an injury to the country."

## THE MARITIME WINTER FAIR.

This year the Maritime Winter Fair will meet at Amherst on December 2-4 and promises to be of exceptional interest to our Island farmers. Here our grain crop has been exceptional both in quantity and quality. In Ontario, on the

contrary the grain crop returns were not satisfactory, and the scarcity will be felt when New Brunswick and Nova Scotia farmers are again as usual looking for their supply of seed grain in the spring. Next spring they will have to pay high prices for all that they buy in the west. They will naturally turn to the Island as a near and fruitful source of supply. The Winter Fair will afford a fine opportunity for advertising our grain in the neighboring Provinces and our farmers will find it advantageous to make a special effort in preparing to compete. The Department of Agriculture will send a man over to the Fair who will take charge of all the grain exhibits and arrange them so as to show to advantage. The time would seem to be opportune for opening up a good seed trade with the sister Provinces, as all must see who will consider the condition existing.

## Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, which is not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section (10 acres, more or less). Application for entry must be made personally by the applicant to the District Agency or Sub-agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may however, be made at an Agency or certain conditions by the father, mother, and daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans: (1) A clearing of the residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desire, permit the required residence duties by him or his wife, or by a person residing in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership of land is not permitted. (3) If the father for mother, if the father is deceased, of an homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him or her, or if the homesteader is or was a homesteader on farming land, or if the homesteader is or was a homesteader on such homestead duties by living with the father or mother. (4) The term "residence" as defined in the preceding regulations shall mean a dwelling of not more than five miles in a direct line, measured at the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement. (5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above may live with his family on farming land owned by himself, must notify the Agent of the District of his intention. (6) Six months before the date of application to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of intention to apply for entry. Don't forget the minister of the Interior.
