His Honour the Lieutenant Governor assented to: An Act for the Prevention of Frauds in connection with the Sale of Securities; An Act respecting the Provincial Police Force; and An Act to Amend the Statute Law. The House adjourned until 3 p. m. Monday.

Continued from Page 1. HON. MR. STEWART: I am not objecting to giving you any power at all. I want to be consistent.

The 1919 Act. MR. A. F. ARSENAULT: It strikes me, Mr. Chairman, that we are going a little fast to try to put it through at this session. It was admitted by the Premier that we are rushing at the last moment and that now the Government has not had time to think this matter over very seriously and give it the due consideration it deserves. The report of the Education Commission, as I take it, asks for certain things. Among other things they recommend that the teachers should receive higher salaries, but that, before legislation can be passed to that effect that would be satisfactory to the people, you must refer that question to the people to find out whether or not they are willing to pay more in salaries. You must, in other words, have a referendum. It was a fine way to advise the Government how to raise more money, and I presume that this administration was delighted to have the Commission point out the ways and means by which this could be done; because if they had made the bare recommendation to pay the teachers more money without suggesting the Government in a very awkward situation. We recall that in 1919, when the plebiscite was taken on Education by the Arsenault Government, it almost carried. We find that today, throughout the country, there is the conviction that that was just the way in which the matter should have been settled. We see our mistakes. I believe myself that if the same referendum were put to the people that was put in 1919 it would carry very easily; and I would suggest to the present administration that it would go a long way in preparing the ground to state what they want and give the people something definite to vote on. Otherwise, if they come with something else, the people will say that they are trying to make a political question of it again; so I think they had better get back to the 1919 policy of the Conservative Government. (Applause).

HON. MR. STEWART: May I ask the promoter: Who is going to settle the form of the questions? HON. MR. LEA: The Governor-in-Council. That is provided for under another section.

DR. W. J. MCMILLAN: Are not the members of this Legislature entitled to a knowledge of what is going into an Act before it is passed? HON. MR. LEA: This is only for a ballot.

DR. MCMILLAN: A ballot on what? HON. MR. LEA: To take a referendum. DR. MCMILLAN: On what? HON. MR. LEA: On anything. DR. MCMILLAN: To take a referendum on anything? HON. MR. LEA: That is of public importance. DR. MCMILLAN: So it might be another plebiscite on Prohibition? (No answer).

DR. MCMILLAN: You are trying to do something; or rather you are trying to show the teachers that you are doing something by doing nothing. This is a demonstration of your

Continued from Page 1. HON. MR. STEWART: But you have a general idea; and you have a right to take the House into your confidence.

HON. MR. LEA: So far as the recommendations of the Education Commission will be carried out they will go on the ballot. My hon. friend knows of the recommendations to be submitted to the people by ballot. We are simply giving the necessary authority to take the referendum.

HON. MR. STEWART: But why isn't the general subject matter of the referendum set forth in this bill? Admitting, for the sake of argument, that you may not have had sufficient time—though you should have had—to decide the very phraseology of the questions to be placed on the ballot, you have at least a general knowledge of the subject matter to be submitted. Why not put that in the Act?

HON. MR. LEA: We might have some questions regarding the salaries of the teachers, but it might be necessary for us, in our discretion as a Government, to put something else on the ballot; and we are giving ourselves this power.

HON. MR. STEWART: Will my hon. friend say now that the referendum is to be taken at the next provincial election? HON. MR. LEA: Yes.

HON. MR. STEWART: You have amended the section to that extent? HON. MR. LEA: Yes.

HON. MR. STEWART: When does my hon. friend expect the next provincial election to be held? HON. MR. LEA: Logically, we would expect it a year from next summer.

HON. MR. STEWART: Then why not leave it until the next session of this Legislature? HON. MR. LEA: We are simply agreeing with the recommendations of the Commission; showing our anxiety for the situation and showing that we want to deal with it today.

HON. MR. LEA: Because we are endeavoring to show our sincerity in carrying out as many of the recommendations of the Commission as we can.

HON. MR. STEWART: You are carrying out nothing by this Act. You might just as well make a general statement to the people that you are going to pass it. It is only a gesture; it is not a statute at all. (Applause).

HON. MR. LEA: Suppose that a generous contribution to the revenues might be received; probably that three million dollars that my hon. friend has twitted me about with regard to our subsidy claims? HON. MR. STEWART: You didn't tell us anything about that when you were speaking in the budget debate. (Applause).

HON. MR. LEA: Well, suppose that it took place; in our anxiety to give the teachers an increase as quickly as possible we could bring this into effect before the next session of the House.

HON. MR. STEWART: And if my hon. friend gets the three million dollars that he knows so much about, is he then going to impose this tax? HON. MR. LEA: Which tax? We are not asking for a tax; we are asking for a referendum.

HON. MR. STEWART: That is the trouble. You won't tell us what you are going to put in the referendum.

HON. MR. LEA: At the present time we don't know.

HON. MR. STEWART: You don't know? HON. MR. LEA: No.
