THREE CHILDREN ARE STRUCK DEAD AT MOON RIVER

PARRY SOUND, July 13.—Three children of Herbert Hudgins, caretaker, at Moon River, 25 miles out of Parry Sound, were instantly killed late last night when lightning struck their home.

The children, one boy, aged fourteen, and two girls, ten and eight years old, had gone to bed in their own rooms, but becoming frightened by the storm, slipped into their father's bed in another room.

Lightning struck a tree just outside the room, and rebounded into the room, killing the children immediately. The youngest girl was horribly burnt. Her father escaped injury. A fourth child was knocked insensible.

The bodies were taken to an undertaking establishment today. Herbert Hudgins lives permanently at Moon River, and has for several years looked after several cottages there. His house was slightly damaged by fire caused by the lightning.

—CHARLES MCCORMACK, C. N. R. SECTION FOREMAN.—The funeral of Charles McCormack C. N. R. section - foreman which took place on Sunday afternoon, from his late home at Gowan Brae to Saint Mary's Church and cemetery is said to have been the largest and most imposing that has ever taken place in the Eastern part of the Island.

Few men had more true friends throughout the country than Mr. McCormack. It is estimated there were a hundred automobiles in the funeral procession as well as some sixty carriages. The funeral was in charge of undertaker Lavie of Souris, arriving at St. Mary's Church, Souris, the remains were met at the Church door by the assistant pastor, Reverend Father Croken, in the absence of Monsgr. McLean, who was sick in bed. After preliminary service in the church vestibule the body was wheeled into the Church when the Requiem service began. The priest was assisted by Revs. Father Sinnott, and Father Timothy Mullally (an old neighbor of the deceased). The full choir of St. Mary's was in place, the organ ably presided over by Mrs. William J. Paquet. The choir rendered excellent music and the Dead March in Saul played on the organ as the pageant passed out of the Church to the cemetery was very touching and was a fine tribute to Mrs. Paquet's musical ability.

The three priests lead the way to the grave-side where the last sad rites were ended. "Dust thou art and to dust thou shalt return." Charles McCormack (Charley Mosey) retired from the Souris-Harmony section through ill health some ten years ago after 36 years of steady work on the road, for the last twenty section foreman. He suffered from diabetes. He was but 64 years of age at death, a comparatively young man. He went on the Souris-Harmony section under the late Ben McEachern, when but seventeen years of age. His wife nee Mary Jane McDonald predeceased him 6 years ago. His son and young wife kept house for him since then as well as another son also living with him. Charles McCormack hadn't an enemy in the world as the big funeral showed so tangibly. He loved his fellow men, and they loved him in return. Railway men from along the line from Elmira west to Morell and from the city congregated en masse at his funeral in addition to the numerous friends and acquaintances.

D. Purdy, General Manager. July 15 has been set as cut-off date for the 1930-31 pool, and subsequent deliveries will be taken on the thirty cent initial payment basis, this price list being subject to revision later depending on the general market situation.
