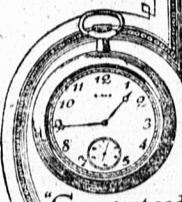

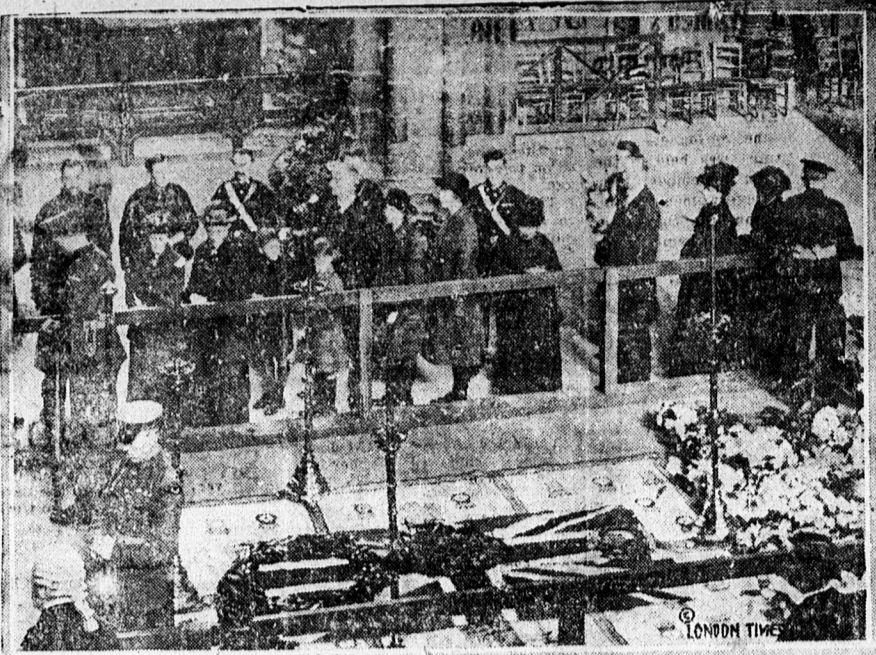

PARIS, Dec. 16.—A daughter was born today to Mr. and Mrs. Georges Carpentier. The champion admitted that he was somewhat disappointed, as he hoped for a boy, but added cheerily: "I will make a champion tennis player out of her."

BOSTON, Dec. 16.—"Rabbit" Maranville in all probability has played his last game with the Boston Braves. The little shortstop, who has been the active spirit of the team on the field for years, is in the block with several teams bidding for him. Whether Chicago, New York, Pittsburg or another club gets him is uncertain but President Grant says he is up for trade. The Braves want two good players for Maranville himself is understood to be eager for a change.

Bill Brennan A Busy Boxer

Has Knocked Out Many, Mostly Inferior Ringmen

Bill Brennan has been boxing for the last six years, according to the records available. Born in County Mayo, Ireland, June 23, 1893, Brennan migrated to Chicago early in life, and followed various occupations before he entered upon his ring career. At one time, it is said, Brennan was an iron worker and that this work developed his natural strength in no small measure. He first started boxing in 1914, and has been competing regularly since that time. He has compiled a lengthy list of knockouts.

Despite his imposing record of decisive ring triumphs, Brennan never attained the front rank in the country's heavyweight division. His list of knockouts has been compiled at the expense of comparatively inferior boxers, many of whom were seldom ever heard of outside their local districts.

Brennan in the past has been inclined to a round physique, which has made him slow almost to the point of being sluggish. He possessed punishing punching power, however, and against the majority of his opponents appeared comparatively fast. His most important fight was against Jack Dempsey in 1919 before the latter gained the world's heavyweight title from Jess Willard. In this encounter the referee halted the bout, after Brennan had been floored five times, in order to save the Chicagoan from further punishment.

Brennan's record, as already stated, consists mostly of bouts against boxers of purely local reputation. Among the more prominent heavyweights he has engaged in the ring are Joe Cox, the Missouri giant; Tom Cowler, British heavyweight; Jim Cowler, the Roscommon boxer; Battling Levinsky, Billy Miske, Harry Greb, Bartley Madden, Ole Anderson, Captain Bob Roper, Willie Meehan and Tom McMahon, who was known as the "Pittsburg Bearcat." The only knockout victory appearing in this list is registered against Cox who was polished off in three rounds in a bout on August 3, 1917. In the same year Brennan boxed a draw with Levinsky, and later won a decision over the Philadelphian. In 1918 Brennan won two decisions over Billy Miske and engaged Harry Greb in three no-decision encounters and one drawn battle, which went fifteen rounds. The Chicagoan's record for this year includes no-decision contests with Bartley Madden, Bob Roper and Ole Anderson, in addition to decisive victories over Madden and Willie Meehan in twelve and six-round engagements, respectively.

Championship Fight Jan. 14

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—Articles were signed here today for a world's lightweight championship fight between Benny Leonard, present title-holder, and Ritchie Mitchell, of Milwaukee, to be held in Madison Square Garden, on January 14, next. The men will fight for a purse of \$60,000, of which Leonard has been guaranteed \$10,000 and Mitchell \$20,000. The contestants will weigh in at 135 pounds at 2 p.m. on the day of the contest. They have posted \$5,000 forfeits.

The net profits of the encounter will be donated to the fund for devastated France.

Indians To Train At Dallas, Texas

CLEVELAND, Dec. 16.—Dallas (Texas) has been tentatively selected as the spring training camp for the champions, according to President Dunn of the Cleveland Americans. The selection, Dunn said, had been left entirely to Speaker.

Nine exhibition games have been either definitely or tentatively arranged. Two are with the New York Giants and two with the Cincinnati Reds, at Dallas, two with the Reds at Cincinnati, two at New Orleans with New Orleans, and one at Indianapolis.

Carpentier Not To Fight Moran

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Georges Carpentier, champion heavyweight pugilist of Europe, who left for Paris today after a visit to London to witness the fight between Frank Moran, of Pittsburg, and Joe Beckett, the English heavyweight, on Friday last, declared flatly that he would not fight anyone prior to his match with Jack Dempsey.

This statement was made in answer to widely published reports that he was about to sign for a match with Moran, and that he also would fight Tommy Burns, the former champion.

Francois Deschamps, Carpentier's manager, asserted that Carpentier's contract with Dempsey precluded any fight prior to that with the champion. Discussing the arrangements with Dempsey, Carpentier said it did not make the slightest difference to him where he fought for the championship. "Any place in the world suits me," he declared.

Jornny McIntyre Still In Danger

SASKATOON, Sask., Dec. 16.—Further improvement is announced in the condition of Jornny McIntyre, pugilist, who was knifed three times in a street brawl here on Sunday. He is not yet out of danger, however.

The attorney-general's department ordered that McIntyre's evidence be taken at the hospital where he is lying. A special commissioner was appointed and with the crown and defence lawyers present the wounded boxer gave his version of the fight, pointing to Donald A. McLaren, the man held by the police, as the one who jabbed him with a long knife. McIntyre gave his testimony in a gasping voice and several times restoratives were administered to enable him to continue his story.

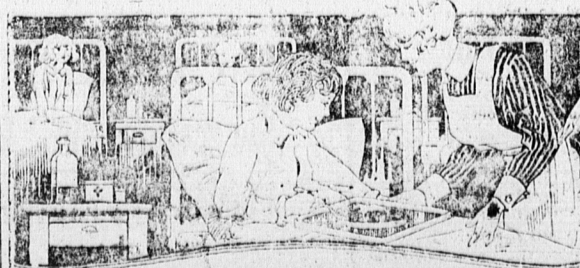
