In Memoriam

MICHAEL BERNARD HORGAN

There passed peacefully away in the Charlottetown Hospital in the early morning of September 2nd, 1936, the soul of Michael Bernard Horgan of Stanhope, at the early age of 23 years.

His death resulted from injuries received in an automobile collision the preceding evening while he was returning to his home from attending a mission in his parish church at Covehead Road with his father, mother and other members of the family. Although in an unconscious condition by reason of a badly crushed leg and severe head injuries when taken to the hospital, by

the kind disposition of Providence he regained consciousness about 3 A. M. the following morning and received the last rites of the Holy Catholic Church. He died shortly afterwards.

How futile are words to express the shock and the grief which his sudden death caused to his family and to the surrounding communities. Snatched away in the very flower and vigor of youth, the beauty and wholesomeness of early manhood, he has left to his sorrowing family the most beautiful memories, the memories of a grand boy, one who was ever kind and respectful towards his parents, loving and considerate towards his brothers and sisters. To his friends and neighbors he has left the memory of an honest, upright boy, one who was

cheerful and steady, ever ready to help. It may readily be said he was an exemplary young man. In death, as in life, may he be a guiding star to all those who knew him.

He was a member of the choir of St. Eugene's Church and secretary of the Holy Name Society. In his boyhood days he had served in the Sanctuary for several years.

He has left to mourn a sorrowing father and mother, five brothers, James, Thomas, John, Patrick and Joseph and four sisters, Helena, Mary, Estelle and Rita to whom the sincerest sympathy is extended.

His funeral which took place Friday, September 4, from his late residence at St. Eugene's Church, Covehead Road, was one of the largest ever seen in the community. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by his pastor, Rev. Francis McQuaid. Other priests present in the Sanctuary were: Rev. Dr. J. A. Murphy, Rev. Clarence Pitre, Rev. Dr. Richard Ellsworth and Rev. Father Howard, C.S.S.R. High Mass was sung by Mr. H. J. Brown with Mrs. Joseph Dougan at the organ.

The pall bearers were: Vincent Doyle, Harry McLeod, Joseph Maye, Francis Burt, William McAulay and Walter McLaughlan. The many Mass Cards and floral tributes testified to the esteem in which he was held.

Mr. John F. Farmer was appointed chairman, and, after stating why it was that so many were gathered there called on Mr. Wendall McKenna to read an address.

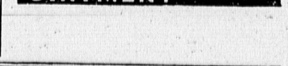
Both Mr. and Mrs. McKenna very feelingly expressed their thanks for the kind way in which their friends remembered the anniversary.

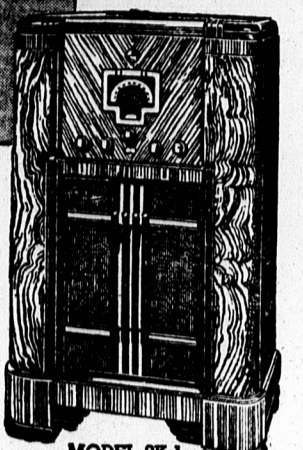

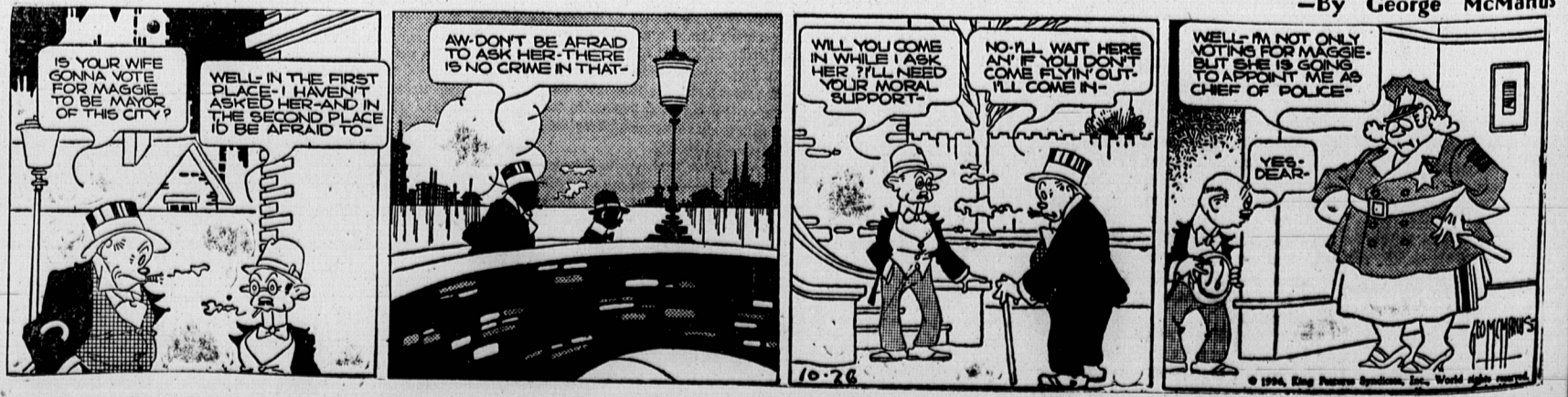

Makes Last Sailing From Montreal Thurs.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—The "vagabond cruise" ship "Colborne", Canadian National Steamships, is due in the local port on Monday returning from a voyage to Puerto Rico, Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana. She is one day over schedule on account of taking on heavy cargo enroute north and discharging a large quantity of molasses at Charlottetown and Quebec.

The "Colborne" is due to sail again next Thursday on a voyage to the same Caribbean colonies via Halifax and on this voyage will make special calls at Basseterre, St. Kitts, Pointe-A-Pitre, Guadeloupe, Fort-De-France, Martinique and Kingston, St. Vincent. During the voyage on these passenger-carrying freighters, patrons make the ship their home and any extended time at sea due to extra calls is included in the cruise fare. They have been well booked during the summer and fall sailings and with the arrival of the winter sailing season it is expected that

they will carry capacity booking throughout the season.

The sailing next Thursday from Montreal will be the last appearance in port this season for the "Colborne" since she will use Halifax as her port during the winter
