SCHOOL INSPECTION.—The School Inspectors of the province were in Charlottetown last Friday and Saturday, consulting with one another and with Superintendent Campbell concerning the finishing up of the work of the present school term and the planning of more vigorous and better work for next term.

Premier Matheson took advantage of the meeting to hold a lengthy conference with the Superintendent and Inspectors concerning the condition of the schools, and the best means of further improving them. As there are now five inspectors devoting their whole time to the work, Mr. Wilfred Boulter, Tryon, Mr. Jas. Vix, Mr. Marin Gallant, Urbanville, H. Devereaux, Kelly's Cross, Mr. Vernon Crockett, York, and Mr. D. J. Mullin, St. Peter's, it is expected that every school in the province will be visited at least twice a year and that the more backward schools will receive special attention.

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
