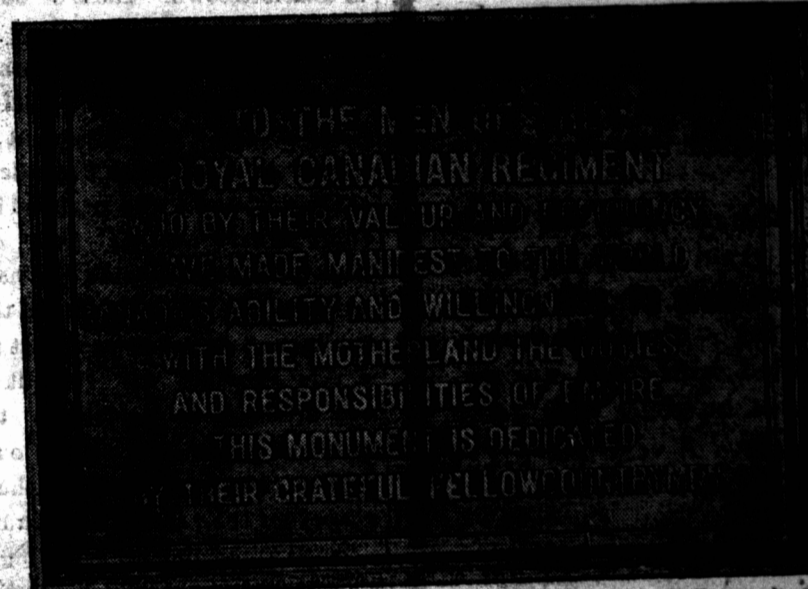

THE FOURTH AT WASHINGTON

THE PROGRAM FOR 'TO DAY.

The brigade now at Camp Brighton will form at 1.30 p. m. march off at 1.45, picking up en route Nos 1 and 2 companies of the 4th Regiment C. A., and Charlottetown Engineers to Queen Square where the brigade will be formed up.

The Light Horse will form on their own parade ground and march off in time to form upon Brigade Parade at 1.30 p. m.

The troops will be formed in three sides of a square, the flanks resting on the Law Courts Building on one side, and the Provincial Building on the other, so as to completely enclose the monument. The men will be formed five or six deep, and it is expected that there will be 100 men in one rank.

At 2.30 proceedings will open by patriotic ode sung by Philharmonic Society and school children.

Statue will be unveiled by Lord Aylmer on request of chairman, Mr. Justice Fitzgerald.

Dedicatory prayer by Rev. T. F. Fullerton.

Corporal's guard from the Engineers will hang a wreath on the pedestal in Memoriam.

Oration—Sir Louis Davies.

Ticket holders are requested to be in their places not later than 2.15. Entrance at east door of Court house.

The school children will muster at the Queen Square School Ground and be at the stand at 2 o'clock.

The troops will line up at that hour.

Lord Aylmer is expected to arrive on the ground at 2.25 and the Lieut Governor at 2.30. The proceedings will commence immediately.

INDEPENDENCE DAY AT WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, July 4—(Special)—The Government joined with the citizens of the District of Columbia in a general commemoration of Independence Day.

READING OF THE DECLARATION.

Admiral Dewey introduced Barry Buakler who read the Declaration of Independence.

SECRETARY FOR IRELAND SPEAKS

Defending the Proposed Fiscal Enquiry by Government

Time Come to Review Free Trade—The Czar not to Visit Rome—Many American Sailors Deserted at Kiel

SECRETARY WYNDHAM FAVORS INQUIRY.

LONDON, July 4—(Special)—Secretary Wyndham speaking at the dinner of the National Union of Conservative Constitutional Associations, defended the policy of enquiry into fiscal questions and said the Cabinet was united on the proposition.

He held that a review of Great Britain's fiscal policy is necessary.

MANY AMERICAN SAILORS DESERTED.

BERLIN, July 4—(Special)—A despatch from Kiel says that since the departure of the American fleet it has been ascertained that 105 American sailors deserted.

CZAR NOT TO VISIT ROME.

ROME, July 4—(Special)—The Czar will not return the visit of the King of Italy this week as had been arranged, probably owing to the anti-Russian demonstration in the Italian Parliament.

THIRTEEN BRIGANDS KILLED.

SALONICA, July 2—A band of 29 brigands has been defeated by Turkish troops near Perlep and thirteen of them killed.

TOKIO, July 4—(Special)—It is said the Chinese Minister at St. Petersburg has informed the Chinese Government that Japan is negotiating direct with St. Petersburg.
