BANK DEAL RATIFIED

HALIFAX, Nov. 1.—The amalgamation of the Union Bank of Halifax and the Commercial Bank of Windsor, N. S., has been sanctioned by the Dominion Government. The Commercial Bank of Windsor now ceases to exist. All the business will now be conducted in the name of the Union Bank of Halifax. The branches of the Commercial Bank have been taken over and all the employees are now officials of the Union Bank. The authorized capital of the Union Bank of Halifax is \$1,705,000 with a subscribed capital of \$1,205,000 and a Reserve Fund of \$775,000.
