Rev. Robert Wasson, a venerable and prominent Canadian Wesleyan Methodist clergyman, born in New Brunswick, and until his superannuation in 1885 pastor of the church in Woodstock, N.B., died suddenly at 688 Park Place, Brooklyn, on Thursday, of pneumonia. He leaves a widow, son and three daughters. Though seventy-two years old he had recently been supplying the pulpit of the Goodsell Methodist church at East New York. Burial will be at his birthplace in New Brunswick. Mr. Wasson's name is a familiar one to many in this Province especially in the Methodist Church.
