The Housewife And Her Activities

TABLOID. The old-fashioned limitation knitted bedspreads purchased in the stores make splendid bath towels when they have served their day as spreads. They are very absorbent.

BOOKS. The dust on books should be removed with a feather or a brush. Using a cloth will remove the grit and cause shabby bindings.

BLACK FELT HATS. Black felt hats can be cleaned and freshened by using a teaspoon of ammonia mixed with one-half cup of cold water.

TOO SHORT HOSE CRAMP THE TOES. Children's stockings ought to be selected carefully. Short ones cramp toes and will eventually make them crooked. Too long ones wrinkle and twist, irritating toes and heels.

ROYAL COVERAGE. The Duchess of Kent has thrown her lot in with women who wear hats in the evening. She appeared with the duke at a restaurant late one evening recently in a black velvet evening gown and tiny black velvet hat with a nose veil.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS. One of the best things to pack china and glassware in is newspaper. Wrap each piece very loosely in at least two thicknesses of paper, using a whole page for

each average sized plate. Wrapping loosely enables the paper to form a resilient cushion that absorbs shocks.

Before you wash your woollen garment draw an outline of it on heavy paper and then pin it in shape so that it will dry in the right size.

Gold brocade can be cleaned by rubbing with a piece of bread that is slightly on the stale side.

LAMP IN OLD INDIAN PALACE NEVER GOES OUT. In an old palace in Travancore (India) is an oil lamp which, according to tradition, has been burning for the past 1200 years.

CARE OF BLANKETS. If your sheets are not sufficiently long to fold back over your blanket, blanket covers may be bought to protect it from soil and unnecessary wear on the satin bindings. If you prefer to make your own blanket covers, simply measure the entire width of your blanket and cut wide enough to allow for about ten inches on either side. Fold lengthwise, sew up the ends, hem the edges, fit over the top of the blanket and baste the cover down. Muehlen dimitry or any material which launders easily is suitable.

When packing sheets, pillow cases, white tablecloths or white goods of any kind for a length of time, wrap them well to prevent them attaining a yellowish tinge. Remove obstinate stains on suede gloves or shoes with benzine applied on a soft piece of flannel. Then put them on and rub with fine oatmeal.

Families Should "Know" Members Dorothy Dix Should Speak Same Language

Home Life Would be Much Happier if Husbands and Wives, Parents and Children Had a Better Understanding of the Good Points in Each

The strangest thing in the world is how little the members of most families really know each other. In nine homes out of ten the husbands and wives and parents and children are just as little acquainted with each other as if they were strangers who did not speak each other's language and who were meeting for the first time.



It seems impossible, but it is true, that men and women can live together in the intimacy of married life for fifty years without ever understanding each other, or getting the slightest inkling of what motivates each other and makes them do what they do. It is an even more incredible fact that parents can bear children, rear them to maturity and know less about them than they do about the office boy or the cook. What is as for brothers and sisters, all they ever find out about each other is their worst points.

Why this should be the case, it is hard to say. Perhaps the family circle is so small that we are too close to the members of our household to get a perspective on their various characteristics. Perhaps familiarity has robbed them of the novelty which would make them interesting and we just take them for granted. Mother is just Mother, and Father is just Father. It comes with a shock of surprise to the children to find out that Mother is considered a great beauty and that Father, to whom nobody listens at home, is an oracle abroad.

And why any boy is ever sap enough to fall for his sister no brother can even begin to know each other. This lack of family acquaintanceship is at the bottom of a lot of the evils of which we complain so much. For one thing, it is the explanation why domestic life is so dull and why an evening at home is generally either a scrapping match or gobs of silence so thick you could cut it with a knife.

The husband and wife are not familiar enough with each other's pretentious to begin a conversation for fear of starting something. And they know little of their children's interests and activities that they are dumb in their presence. When the average mother and father get through saying "don't" to their children and admonishing them to be good and study hard they have nothing further to say to them.

Most of the marriages that are failures are the result of husbands and wives never getting to know each other. The wife doesn't know her husband well enough to realize that the reason he doesn't pay her love is just because he is of a repressed nature and, as Barrie said of himself, "Has to wrap his legs around a table he can ever write 'darling'." He thinks he proves his love by working himself to death, to make her comfortable.

The husband isn't sufficiently acquainted with his wife to know that the reason she is disgruntled and dissatisfied, peevish and complaining is just because she is begging to have a fuss made over her and to be told what a wonderful housekeeper she is; how her husband would be on Poverty Flat instead of Easy Street except for her marvelous management.

The reason there are so many male and female philanderers and so much divorce is because so many lonely, heart-hungry men and women are hunting for mates who will understand them and who won't stay perpetual strangers to them.

Perhaps the worst phase of families not getting acquainted consists in fathers and mothers not bothering to study their children and find out their abilities and talents they have. That would save so many wasted years. It prevents so many failures, keeps so many square pegs out of round holes that they can never fill.

But parents don't trouble to do it. When the average boy and girl consult their fathers and mothers about what occupation they should take up, father and mother haven't an idea to suggest. They have never observed whether Johnny is dull with his hand or quick with his mind; whether Sammy is a born trader or a congenial easy mark; whether nature intended Mary for Hollywood or the kitchen or the poor, blundering children take the wrong turn of the road and throw away half a lifetime hunting for the short cut their parents could have shown them if only they had been acquainted.

THE COOK'S CORNER CARAMEL MACAROONS FRUITED HERMITS To caramelize condensed milk (that is the sweetened canned milk product—about 12 oz. in the small size can) put unopened can in pan of boiling water and keep at boiling point 3 hours. Keep can covered with water at all times. Cool before opening. Phen can of caramelized condensed milk is cool, open top of can and remove contents, soften them by mashing down with 3 tablepoons boiling water, until paste is smooth; then add 1 lb. of shredded cocconut, mixing in well. Pick up on teaspoon and drop on buttered cookie sheet in compact little rounds, about 1 inch apart. Bake at 300 deg. Fahr. until golden. This will make about 3 dozen macaroons. These will burn easily so do not let the oven go above 300 deg. Fahr. The other little cookie is similar to my hermits—there might be a slight difference in the texture but the flavor is very similar.
