Arrested His Own Son

Tec's Surprised on Trapping Robber Gang.

DUTY V. LOVE

A strange real drama of duty has just come to light. A private detective named James J. Bronson, engaged in tracking down a dangerous gang of criminals, succeeded in entrapping a number of them and confronted their leader, who was wearing a mask over his features, with a revolver.

The leader of the gang, forced to submit in the face of the menacing revolver, tore his mask from his face, and tragically revealed to the detective the features of his own son.

For months past the suburbs of New York have been terrorized by a band of criminals, who have carried out a number of daring hold-ups in private residences. The practice was for one or more members of the gang to call at a chosen house at a certain time. On the door being opened to them, a revolver was leveled at the head of the servant and masked men entered and confronted the head of the house.

Under threat of death or serious bodily injury, the man invariably propped complacent, and readily parted with valuables to get rid of his unwelcome guests.



SHELL MUD

Prince Edward Island is very fortunate in having extensive deposits of oyster and mussel shells in the bays and rivers throughout the whole province.

In the early days these shells were lifted at low tide during the summer, and spread over the fields for fertilizer or burned to secure lime for plastering.

The top layers of many of these deposits were composed of blue mussel shells in the various stages of decomposition. This mud was found to be very valuable when applied to new land or land requiring lime. Ingenious farmers soon invented and constructed mud diggers of different types, but all efficient for lifting these deposits. Some of the first ones were modified on gears, but the general practice of lifting mud through the ice in winter was soon adapted, and most of the surface deposits of mussel mud were quickly exhausted. Underneath these there were deep deposits of oyster shells and in other places extending from near the surface at low tide, to a depth of over 20 feet almost pure oyster shells mud was found. These have all received the general name of mussel-mud after that first used. Large quantities have been lifted at points such as Bedouque Bay and St. Peter's Bay and shipped inland by rail. A dredge has been employed for several summers at the latter place by the Provincial Government, and the mud shipped to localities in need of this fertilizer.

The first application of shell mud to land not previously mudded invariably is most beneficial. It is scarcely ever known to fail to produce most luxuriant crops of clover, following increased root and grain crops. These muds are essentially lime fertilizers usually containing 85 per cent. or over of carbonate of lime with traces of nitrogen and phosphoric acid. They are usually piled on the shore or in small heaps in the field and exposed to frost which breaks down many of the shells before being spread on the land.

Farmers living near the deposits applied very heavy dressings in the early days. It was found when



full of from 400 to 500 lbs. of mud Shell mud is a very economical form of carbonate of lime for land that is sour and in need of lime. But it should not be depended upon for maintaining the fertility of the soil. Light application at reasonable intervals, in conjunction with barnyard manure is good farm practice.
