FUSILIERS NOSE OUT CRYSTALS BY SCORE 6 TO 5

Island Champions Gave Fast And Scintillating New Brunswickers One Of The Best Games This Winter—Series A Long Way From Being Over.

(Special to the Guardian)

SUMMERSIDE, Feb. 27.—A goal-keeper who put the fence in defence aided by two forwards who have contributed most of their scores this season were the principal reasons for the victory of the St. John Fusiliers against the Summerside Crystals in the Crystal Rink here tonight, the visitors posing out at the long end of a 6 to 5 score, after the speediest and most exciting exhibition of Canada's winter pastime that has been seen in Summerside for many years.

The Fusiliers are heavier men than the Crystals, they have three forwards who are equal to first line material and they are all seasoned veterans, but they had to extend themselves to the outside edge of the limit to walk away with the decision last night. Silliphant, Captain of the Crystals, was hurt early in the game and did not fully recover through the evening. Schurman was the only relief man used more than once, but with these handicaps the black and white champions of Prince Edward Island and Eastern New Brunswick put up a wonderful showing, a total of 41 shots were made against the Fusiliers net to 23 against the Crystal goal. And only the phenomenal stopping of Wilson prevented the score being considerably different.

The game was handled by Drummond, St. John and Carroll of Summerside. About 1200 fans saw the fixture, among them several hundred out of town.

First Period

The game got away 9.35, the St. John players being delayed by the heavy ice in the Strait, and did not arrive in Summerside until 7.45 p. m. At the tapoff Gallant made a brilliant run, but lost the rubber to Ernst. Ernst makes a five yard gain, but loses to Silliphant. Ernst trips Schurman and gets a rest. Gallant made a solo run from Crystal territory and shoots past Wilson for the first tally in four minutes. Keating, who scored the majority of goals against Bathurst, makes a pretty run and scores. Gallant runs through the entire Fusilier line and makes his second tally. Keating gets a rest for tripping. On his return Ferguson is given two minutes. Schurman gets two minutes for holding Clark's stick. Play is strong around the Fusiliers' net, but Wilson saves in great style. Silliphant draws a minor penalty for checking. Keating intercepts a pass from Schurman to Gallant and makes a nice run, notching up his second for the Winter Port boys. Period ends with play strong in Fusilier territory. Score: Crystals 2; St. John 2.

Second Period

Five minutes after the whistle for the second period Bartlett gets the rubber and shows a rolling shot past Crockett for the third Fusilier score. Wright collides with Ferguson and is given two minutes. For a while it is wide open hockey, every man playing for himself and exceptional individual being as common as powder on a flapper's nose. Thompson gets a rest for illegal checking. Schurman collides with the referee and is given a rest. The Fusiliers have the puck back of their own nets and Keating and Clark kill time to recover from the rapid pace of the earlier minutes of the period. Silliphant makes a spectacular run, but loses the rubber to Bartlett. Schurman trips Clarke and gets a ticket. Gallant makes a nice solo run shoots wait high, but Wilson is right there. Keating gets two minutes for body checking. McDowell, Clarke gets the rubber and makes a fast knee high shot for the fourth St. John tally. Gallant makes a nice run past the Fusilier defence, but Wilson gets it on the pad and saves nicely. Bartlett gets a rebound shot and pours a hot one at Crockett, who makes a splendid save. Thompson gets two minutes for checking. Gallant. Score: Crystals 2; St. John 4.

Third Period

The third opened with a brilliant run by Silliphant, who loses to Ernst. Clarke gets the rubber and scores a hot one at Wilson, who saves on his knees. Keating gets two minutes for checking Gallant. Four minutes after the tap-off Schurman sags the twine for the third Crystal tally. Feldstein makes his contribution three minutes later, taking the rubber on a pass from Silliphant to Gallant. Mountain draws a ticket for tripping. Feldstein gets a rest for illegal checking. After seven minutes of nerve-straining play in center ice Gallant gets the puck and drives in the fourth Crystal goal. Wright gets a ticket for checking and with the Crystal defence one man short, the Fusiliers played four men forward in a determined effort to clinch the game. Gallant shoots, Wilson saves, but seems in pain. Gallant shoots, again Wilson saves. Silliphant gets the rebound and shoots hard, following the puck, Wilson falls and bits his head against the goal frame work. There is a dispute regarding the goal, but finally Referee Drummond orders the men to centre. Silliphant gets a rest for tripping. Keating gets a ticket, followed by Thompson and with the Fusilier line-up two men short, and only 2 minutes to go, the Crystals make a desperate effort to even the score, but the final bell shows the tally unchanged and the Fusilier defence against the St. John defence.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 27.—The demand from local and foreign buyers for grain here today was quiet. The only enquiry being for odd cars of oats for all rail shipment from Fort William spot prices were firm. The trade in spring and winter wheat grades of flour was moderately active and the undertone was steady. The millfeed market was active and firm, the demand for standard grades of rolled oats continued inactive and prices were unchanged. A fair amount of business was done in fresh eggs and special values were firm in the afternoon. The market advanced three cents per dozen, demand was good and the small supplies available. The receipts were 551 cases. The demand for Quebec potatoes continued good and prices ruled firm. A feature of the latter trade was the strong feeling that developed and prices scored another advance of 12c per lb. This was attributed to the small offerings by holders and the stronger cable advices. The receipts were 443 packages. Extreme dullness also marked the local and export trade in cheese but the undertone was firm. The receipts were 117 boxes. Team market not available tonight.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 27 (Eggs)—There is a strong consumptive demand for eggs in the larger consuming markets of the east and a slightly firmer tone. Receipts in the west continue to increase.

TORONTO.—The local market is firmer but some what nervous. Dealers are quoting country shippers extra 35-38 cents 37, seconds 25 delivered; prices to retail: eggs extra 44-45, firsts 42-43, seconds 31. Fresh poultry receipts are light and the market is firm.

Well Known Contractor Dead

MR. FRANK D. MACDONALD WAS WELL KNOWN IN CHARLOTTETOWN

The Halifax Chronicle of the 25th says:—Word was received in the city yesterday that Frank D. Macdonald, Halifax contractor, employed with a construction company at Bath, Pennsylvania, had been the victim of a fatal accident, while at work on an electric power plant on Thursday afternoon. The deceased who is a brother-in-law of D. A. Cameron, K. C. Sydney, is survived by a wife and four children residing at 34 Market Place, Halifax.

Details of the tragedy were lacking yesterday morning, and other than to state that Mr. Macdonald had been killed while at his work Thursday afternoon, the telegram received by Mrs. Macdonald that night had nothing to say. The deceased had been in the construction business for a number of years, and went to Bath a short time ago. The remains are to be sent home for burial.

Besides his widow, four children—Clarence, Kenneth, Evelyn and Doris survive him. His father, Hugh Macdonald, lived at Sydney.

Mr. Macdonald was employed in connection with the construction of the Hillsborough Bridge, having the contract for conveying the superstructure from Miramichi. For a time he was a resident of Charlottetown, where many friends will regret to learn of his death. He was married to Miss Bessie Aitken, daughter of Mrs. G. A. Aitken of Georgetown, now of Summerside.
