#### NO DIVISION ON SECOND READING

(Canadian Press)  
(By Guardian's Special Wire)  
OTTAWA, March 1.—A government bill amending the Farmers' Creditors' Arrangement Act passed without division today in the House of Commons.

All parties seemed to be in agreement drastic remedies must be applied to agricultural debts in Canada. W. J. Loucks (Cons. Rosetown) proposed a country-wide moratorium on interest on farm mortgages for five or 10 years. George Coote (F.A. MacLeod) urged a maximum interest rate of four or five percent which would extend through loan companies to the original owners of the money.

The main change in the Debt Adjustment Act would extend from 60 to 90 days the period in which no court actions may be taken against a farmer who applies to an official receiver for adjustment of his debts. Finance Minister E. N. Rhodes said 7,000 applications had been received for debt adjustments in the few months the act had been operative and they were beginning to pile up.

Claim Act Unjust

From two French-Canadians came opposition to the Debt Adjustment Act. Eusebe Roberge (Lib. Megantic) said it was unjust and damaging to farmers' credit. Vincent Dupuis (Lib. Laprairie-Napierville) (Continued on Page 13)

#### Pair Leap From Plane To Death

Swiss School Teacher  
& Sweetheart Suicide  
To Escape Disgrace

BERNE, Switzerland, March 1.—A young Swiss school teacher and his sweetheart leaped to their deaths from an aeroplane today apparently to escape possible disgrace growing out of his alleged misuse of school funds.

The two—Charles Grider, 25, Lausen teacher, and Mlle. Antoinette Joery, 22—hired the sightseeing plane to take them over the town of Lausen after, police said, they toasted each other gaily in champagne for nearly an hour.

While Grider diverted the pilot's attention, the authorities said, his sweetheart forced open the emergency door of the ship and jumped. Forced to stick to his controls, the pilot watched helplessly as the man followed her to death.

The Lausen teacher had been suspended from his post by the school as a result of a shortage in his accounts as treasurer of the athletic association.

#### Islander Dies From Exhaustion In N.B. Woods

James Costain, Of  
Portage Is  
Victim.

IN POOR HEALTH  
Was Walking With Island  
Companion To Lum-  
ber Camp.

ST. STEPHEN, N. B., March 1.—Overcome by exhaustion and exposure in the woods near Barber Dam, James Costain, 26, of Portage, P. E. I., was dead here tonight. He had been in poor health and became ex-  
hausted while walking from one lumber camp to another with Leo Blanchard, also of Prince Edward Island. Costain was dead when Blanchard returned with help.

Both young men had walked to a camp, where Blanchard remained until Costain returned from a visit to another camp. Having already plodded through deep snow for ten miles, Costain became ex-  
hausted after he had set out together again. He told Blanchard to continue ahead and have a fire ready.

With Costain failing to reach the camp in a reasonable time, Blanchard retraced his steps and found his chum lying on the ground. He dragged him more than a mile through the snow. Then, his own strength failing, Blanchard covered the other with his coat and went for help. Costain had expired when Blanchard returned.

Dr. H. S. Everett, coroner for Charlotte County, decided that death had been due to exposure and exhaustion and that an inquest would not be necessary. An examination by Dr. E. W. Gray, Milltown, confirmed the cause of death.

The body was brought to St. Stephen pending word from Prince Edward Island.

#### Received Fresh News Re Kidnap

NEW YORK, March 1.—Hans Borchers, German Consul General, confirmed today reports in Boston that he had received fresh information concerning the Lindbergh kidnaping from Baron Kurt von Tippelskirch, German Consul General there.

Borchers refused to give details of information, however, until an investigation is made. Until then he would not say whether it implicates Bruno Hauptmann, convicted of the Lindbergh baby's murder.

"The matter may have no foundation," the Consul General said. "We get letters with information like this almost every day."

At Boston it was reported two men, whose names were not revealed, had imparted information to the German Consul General there concerning the kidnaping and had given "revenge" as the motive for the crime.

#### GRAPHIC STORY OF RACE TO STRICKEN SHIP

Captain of Liner Euro-  
pa Describes Race  
to Scene of Freight-  
er Blairgowrie.

SOUTHAMPTON, March 1.—A graphic story of the liner Europa's race to the lost British steamer Blairgowrie, lying helpless in mid-Atlantic during the hurricane Tuesday night, was told by Captain Oscar Scharf when the Europa anchored in Cowes Roads today.

"The hurricane was the worst I have seen in 35 years," Capt. Scharf declared. "The waves were mountainous and the wind was blowing with terrific force. As soon as we picked up the Blairgowrie's SOS we started toward her as fast as we could, reaching the spot she indicated about midnight."

Too Late

"We couldn't find any trace of the ship," the Captain continued, "weather conditions were such that it was impossible to see very far although we had our searchlights on. I am certain we were very close to the ship; but I suppose we were too late. We had a number of lifeboats prepared, and in getting them ready six of the Europa's crew were badly hurt by being thrown about owing to the rolling of the liner."

Three hours before the Europa reached the position of the Blairgowrie, which had 28 men, nearly all from Glasgow, aboard, the freighter had wirelessed the Europa she did not expect to be able to last another five minutes.

Windows Smashed

Captain Scharf added that ten "three-plate glass windows on the promenade deck 65 feet above the waterline were smashed and the water was breaking over our forecastle."

"The Captain and radio operator of the Blairgowrie behaved like men in their last moments. Their messages came over so clearly they must have been keeping calm, and we know they stuck to their posts to the end. I should like to write to their relatives and tell them how brave these men were."

#### Cut Down With Chinese Captors Says Witness

British Authorities Seek Aid Of  
Chinese National General In  
Locating Young Missionary  
Pair Recently Missing.

CHANGTSEH, Hunan Province, China, March 1.—Two British missionaries, R. A. Bosshardt and A. Hayman, captured by communists in Kweichow Province last October, have been executed by their captors, according to Chinese reports reaching missionaries here.

A Chinese asserted he saw the hacked bodies of the two missionaries lying in a street in the village of Fengchiangkun, 10 miles west of Tayung in Northwestern Hunan Province. He reported the alleged double murder occurred Christmas Day and said the incident had not been reported sooner because of the remoteness of the village and the difficulty of penetrating Red Army lines.

"Mission headquarters at Shanghai have as yet received no word of the reported slayings."

CUT DOWN

The eye-witness declared Bosshardt and Hayman were slain along with other captives after the time limit specified in the ransom demands had expired. The plea of the two missionaries for extension of the time was fruitless, he said, and they were cut down together with their Chinese companions.

No direct word has been received from Bosshardt and Hayman by the China inland mission since early last December, when they wrote what may have been their last letter.

#### FISH AND GAME QUARTERLY MEETING

License Fees, Protec-  
tion of Game And  
Fish, and the Dis-  
tribution of Fry Dis-  
cussed.

That the Government be requested to reduce the trout fishing license fee from the present charge of \$5.00 to \$1.00 was decided at a quarterly meeting of the Fish and Game Protective Association held last night at which the President, Mr. W. E. Tidmarsh presided.

It was also decided to ask that the fishing regulations be changed so as to require that all persons fishing trout have a permit, to be issued to residents free. The discussion rose out of a letter read by the president from the Tourist Association in Washington, D. C.

This letter suggested that lower license fees would be likely to increase the tourist trade and it was felt by those present that such might be the case.

Reference was made to complaints that the killing of rabbits did not stop when the season closed on January 31st. Inspector Fripps of the R. C. M. P. who was present said that no complaints have been received by the police. He suggested that if anyone had any complaints to make that they make them to the police. The Inspector said that the R. C. M. P. patrols out now checking up on trout fishing and partridge shooting.

Mr. H. C. White of the Dominion Biological Board suggested that farmers might do much to help the Hunarian partridge by putting out (Continued on Page 13)

#### VENIOT ASKS COMMONS TO PROTECT HIM

Says He Is Threatened  
With Contempt Of  
Court For State-  
ments Made In  
House.

OTTAWA, March 1.—Hon. Peter Veniot, former post-master-general, stood in the House of Commons today and warned he would fight if anyone attempted to arrest him. He called for protection of the House against possible action for contempt of court arising from statements made by a Montreal lawyer in the Bronfman preliminary hearing in that city.

The veteran Gloucester Liberal started the House at the end of a leisurely discussion of farmers' debts when he arose to protest utterances of the Montreal lawyer who was said to have asked for a writ against him. It concerned Mr. Veniot's speech in the House a week or so ago when he charged the Royal Canadian Mounted Police used a third-degree method. This was the contempt alleged.

#### Sub Afire Heads For Port

VALETTA, Malta, March 1.—The British submarine Orley, fire in her control room, headed for Gibraltar tonight.

(Advices to the British Admiralty at London said other ships were standing by the Orley, two gave no further details.)

In addition to the Orley, two destroyers, the Witch and the Whitehead, were slightly damaged in collision at sea and returned to this port. All three vessels were participating in manoeuvres of the Mediterranean fleet.

The fire, breaking out in the Orley's control room, brought orders to two other ships to stand by. Later the submarine was instructed to make for Gibraltar. No casualties were reported in either mishap.

Three sailors on the torpedo boat "Intrepid" were injured today as the ship drifted in heavy seas following a breakdown of her engines. She was towed to Toulon, France, by a tug.

LONDON, March 1.—The British merchant fleet will cooperate with the navy in fleet manoeuvres starting March 8 when the Home and Mediterranean fleets will engage in a "battle" as "Red Land" and "Blue Land," it was announced today.

British merchant ships which come into the zone of operations, numbering probably 40 to 45, will belong to one side or the other and aid warships in reporting the sighting of "enemy" vessels.

#### Large Number Visit Upper Canadian Cities

MONCTON, N. B., Mar. 1.—About five hundred Maritimers left here today on the bargain fare coach excursion operated by the Canadian National Railways to visit relatives and friends and do some sightseeing in Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto. About an equal number of passengers boarded Canadian National trains at stations in Riviere Du Loup and Monk, including the Gaspé Peninsula, Quebec City and Three Rivers, Que., were also included in the excursion.

The greater portion of the passengers are bound for Montreal, although Ottawa, Toronto and Quebec City are well represented. Passengers for Montreal, Ottawa, Quebec City and Three Rivers have until Tuesday next in which to return while those for Toronto have an extra day, tickets being good to return Wednesday, March 6th.

#### Establishes New Record

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla., March 1.—"Ward" Cummings, Indianapolis racing champion, today set a new speed record for automobiles powered with Diesel engines when he averaged 133.023 miles an hour on the sands here. The previous record of 125.06 miles an hour was set here Feb. 15 by Dave Evans.

Sir Malcolm Campbell announced that he would definitely take the bluebird out on the racing strip tomorrow for a test run. The beach had improved overnight to such an extent that it was thought probable he would try to break his present record of 272.108 miles an hour previously set here.

#### N.B. DEFICIT OF \$489,203 IS ESTIMATED

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 1.—Presenting an unbalanced budget with no increase in taxation forecast, Hon. A. J. Leger, K. C. Provincial Secretary-Treasurer, today estimated \$489,203 as New Brunswick's deficit for the current fiscal year.

In an uninterrupted address of one hour and 15 minutes in the legislature, he predicted that the 1935 revenues would be \$5,781,650, exceeding those of last year by \$345,152, and that the expenditures would be \$6,270,853, a cut of \$42,197 from last year's outlay. The expenditures authorized by law amount to \$3,991,873, an increase of \$183,993.

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#### Aged Jurist "Shade Better"

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Oliver Wendell Holmes carried on tonight in his fight against pneumonia. A "shade better" than at his bedside said. Physicians indicated the 93-year-old former Supreme Court Justice was holding his own.

Felix Frankfurter, an old friend of the jurist, was pleased that those awaiting word that "Mr. Holmes is in good spirits—he is kidding the nurses."

Earlier in the day Mark Howe, a former secretary, said that physicians found Holmes condition unchanged. "They consider this very encouraging," Howe added. "I gathered that they do not expect any immediate turn for better or worse."

#### Reilly In Hospital

NEW YORK, March 1.—Edward J. Reilly, chief defence counsel at the Hauptmann trial, today entered a hospital to rest for "one or two days" because of a leg infection. Reilly, in a public address recently, mentioned he had been ill during much of the lengthy trial.


#### LAUNCH CANCER RELIEF FUND

OTTAWA, March 1.—The Governor-General Countess Bessborough, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett, Liberal leader Mackenzie King and Sir George Perley joined tonight in launching a 65-day campaign to raise money for a national cancer relief fund to commemorate the 25th anniversary of King George's accession to the throne. The Prime Minister, ill with a cold, was not present but his speech was read by Sir George, acting Premier.

Over a coast-to-coast network of the Canadian Radio Broadcasting Commission the Earl of Bessborough inaugurated the campaign for the King George V Silver Jubilee Cancer Fund for Canada by asking that every household in the Dominion send \$1 or more to Lady Bessborough who has undertaken to receive and acknowledge all contributions which will be turned over for administration to a seven-member board of trustees. The campaign will close May 6, silver jubilee of His Majesty's accession.

#### Lloyd George To Present "New Deal" Plan To Cabinet

LONDON, March 1.—David Lloyd George, the little "Welsh Wizard," called his "new deal" experts into conference tonight to draft detailed recovery plans for Britain after Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald requested their submission to the Cabinet.

The government leader's invitation to Lloyd George, himself a former premier, which was revealed today, said the Cabinet would be pleased to consider the "New Deal" immediately if Lloyd George would submit details, estimates, and calculations.

From home in Churt, the little Welshman, who has been stumping England and Wales in behalf of his plans, telephoned he would be "pleased to accede to the Prime Minister's request." Later he said: "Mr. MacDonald will get a letter from me tomorrow or Monday. I will furnish him all the details he wants. I hope the scheme will be examined by the Cabinet, not merely by officials."

While it was not immediately determined whether the two men would meet to discuss the plan, the fact that Lloyd George personally telephoned to No. 10 Downing Street was regarded as significant.
