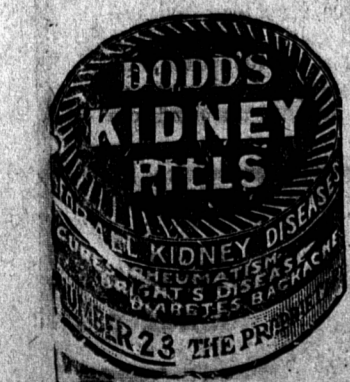

Hughes and Haszard were the next to cross the plate for the Abbies. Saunders hit out one and got around to third where he was put out. The next man fanned. Martin was the first to fan for the Vics. McLeod was hit with the ball and took first. McLeod got home on a wild throw. J. Stanley fanned.

Milford hit one out on which he reached first. Prowse was next up and was put out at first. Milford was caught at the home plate and the second inning ended 6-5 in the Vics' favor.

VanDerstine came next and after having one strike, hit out a beauty but it went foul. He put on another strike and was out. Frank Hennessey got a pass to first. Harry Whitlock came next and cracked out a beautiful three-bagger on which Hennessey came home. McEwen and Hughes each got passes to first. Haszard was caught out at first ending the Abbies half at 6-6.
