**TRAFFIC LEAGUE**

**Frames Resolution**

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 2.—Expressing its misgivings at reports that attempts were made to interject changes in freight rates and their structures the proposed industrial traffic league, in meeting here recently, adopted a resolution to be submitted to the Prime Minister at Ottawa and the Minister of Railways and Canals, placing itself on record as opposed to such inclusion.

The resolution reads in part as follows: "The Canadian Industrial Traffic League places itself strongly on record that it is in opposition to the inclusion of any changes in the freight rate structure of Canada as part of the duties to be undertaken by a committee investigating the transportation conditions in the country, inasmuch as, by direction of Parliament in 1925, the board of railway commissioners for Canada did conduct a general investigation into the freight rate structure throughout Canada, and that this league would strongly condemn any attempts to alter the freight rate structure without such an application having first received the sanction and approval of the railway commissioners, and justified under the provisions of the Railway Act of Canada."

The League also urged that the special committee named to investigate these conditions, be capable of viewing the problems in all its various aspects and therefore include members of the shipping public of Canada.

**INTERNATIONALLY FAMOUS**

Sir Thomas's late activities spread all over the world—tea-gardens in Ceylon, jam factories, bakeries, tin, paper, printing, and soap works.

For many years Sir Thomas resided at Southgate, a pleasant suburb on the northern heights of London. The house, known as Osidge, is roomy but unpretentious, with a fair amount of land around it. In the middle life Sir Thomas enjoyed some enviable friendships. He was for many years a close friend of King Edward, and was privileged to entertain him both on his yacht and at Southgate. It was on Sir Thomas's yacht, then lying off Cowes, that King Edward suffered an accident which might easily have proved fatal. A portion of a mast collapsed and struck the King. The incident happened soon after the King's operation for peritphalitis, which resulted in the postponement of the Coronation. Fortunately the King was not gravely injured. It was King Edward who created Sir Thomas a knight in 1928, and followed this by conferring on him a baronetcy in his Coronation year. One of the many large-scale philanthropies for which Sir Thomas was responsible was the endowment of the Alexandra Trust—an organization for the erection of cheap restaurants—with \$500,000.

Probably Sir Thomas had known and had entertained more royal personages than almost any other man of his time. Practically every journey which the late Empress took during her long residence in England was under the tender care of Sir Thomas Lipton. The present Queen of Spain and four other Princesses were at one time guests on his yacht together for two months. His library at Southgate was filled with autographed photographs of members of nearly every royal house in Europe.

In the country districts not far from his London home Sir Thomas was a well-known figure, especially on Sunday afternoons. For many

Put him in a company who could talk fluently on any matter and he was ready to sit half the night, merely for the enjoyment of listening. He took no strong drink, and never smoked. The late Peter Larkin, Canadian High Commissioner, who was a very old friend of Sir Thomas, once told the present writer of an incident which, said Mr. Larkin, had happened more than once between them. "Here am I at more than 70," declared Sir Thomas, "and I haven't a single relation in the world to care for me." It was
