### WHAT THE ACCOUNTS SHOW

It requires a good deal of faith in the gullibility of human nature to deliberately state, as some of our Liberal friends are doing, that business in Canada has suffered because the guiding hand of Sir Wilfred Laurier was withdrawn from the wheel of national administration.

The depression of the year, what there is of it in Canada, like the cause behind it, is wider than the bounds of any one nation. Moreover, the depression has not put things back to the standard which was thought to represent high prosperity when the Liberal government was in power. There are several recognized standards for measuring the commercial prosperity of a people. These standards show that a good deal more business is being done now in Canada than there was before the Borden Government was formed.

A few days ago a preliminary statement of the foreign trade in the fiscal year 1913-14, ending with March 31, was issued. It showed the total imports of the twelve months were valued at \$633,564,000. In the fiscal year 1910-11, which closed six months before the Laurier Government's defeat, the total imports were valued at \$461,898,000. There is much to lose before the import trade will be as low as when the present Ministry came into office. In the same way the exports of Canadian produce, which were valued at \$431,588,000 in 1913-14, were but \$274,316,000 in 1910-11.

The bank returns give another measure of commercial activity. In September, 1911, just before the change in the administration, the paid up capital of the chartered banks was reported at \$104,392,000, and their reserve at \$90,181,000. On May 31st last, the date of the latest return, the paid-up capital was reported at \$114,783,000, and their reserve at \$113,346,000. Between the same dates, the amount of their notes in circulation increased from \$97,197,000 to \$97,760,000, and this though September is a month of high and May a month of low circulation figures. Also deposits by the public payable in Canada grew from \$891,175,000 to \$1,004,694,000. The banks are stronger, command greater resources and do more business now than they did in 1911.

The Department of Finance recently sent out the report on the business of the insurance companies operating in Canada in 1913, a report summarized in The Guardian at the time. It showed that in regard to the life companies, while they issued \$176,866,000 of new policies in 1911 they issued \$231,608,000 in 1913. In the case of the fire companies the value of policies taken in 1911 was \$1,987,640,000, and in 1913, \$2,869,025,000. These records could not have been made in a time of calamitous depression. They could not have been made by a country suffering from maladministration as grave as to affect its prosperity. Indeed, they could have been made only in a country whose business system was basically sound,

and which, because of that fact, is sure to recover any ground recently lost as soon as the rest of the commercial world, with whose affairs it is bound up, resumes its old rate of progress. Neither political nor any other kind of profit will be made by misrepresenting the facts.

### TELEGRAPHY

At a meeting of the Dominion Royal Commission held recently in London, Mr. Godfrey Isaac, the Managing Director of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company told the Commission of the improvement that had taken place in telegraphic communication within the Empire. Their experience, he said, had enabled the company to construct two new stations, one at Carnarvon, Wales, and the other at Belmar, New York, which would be superior to anything now existing. They were able now to send a hundred words a minute by wireless.

When the new Carnarvon-Belmar service was established he thought they would be able to undertake the whole of the work of the Pacific cable. The company had also in contemplation the establishment of a service between Great Britain and Buenos Aires direct, also to communicate with Brazil, between France and New York and between Norway and New York.

In addition to the above, Mr. Isaacs made the following important announcement: "We propose to offer to supply every newspaper throughout the country with news from Canada daily, at the rate of a half-penny per word, and we propose to make the same offer to the Canadian papers of news from this country, and I think there is little doubt that as stations are developed and constructed in other parts of the Empire that will be further developed." With reference to wireless telephony it was stated to the Commission that Mr. Marconi contemplates, directly he has a few mechanical arrangements made at Carnarvon, that he will be able to telephone to New York.

These are some of the developments that have been quietly going on for the past few years. They are nearing a point at which they will be utilized for commercial purposes. A half-penny per word for messages across the Atlantic, as compared with the almost prohibitive cable prices of today means that world news will be available to the press at prices within reach of all, while the possibility of talking across the Atlantic approaches the miracle stage. This is an age of development.

### SPECULATION

Some of our exchanges have little faith in the oil boom over which the province of Alberta is in a fever. The Toronto Sun, generally well informed and always prudent, says that expert opinion is apparently unanimous in discrediting the claims of the Calgary promoters. "The outflow, which is almost pure gasoline, has, says the Sun been derived by distillation or the condensation of petroleum gases probably filtering through the rock strata for long distances. There is therefore no good reason to believe that a profitable discovery has been made."

A wild speculation in oil stocks has broken out. The press, whose publishers were passing the other day, high strung resolutions against false and fraudulent advertising, has, with some notable exceptions, been freely advertising these oil stocks. The brokers and promoters are invading the towns and villages of Ontario and other parts of Canada and the credulous are pouring their money into oil stocks. Some day, doubtless, there will be an awakening and the credulous will find they have exchanged good money for oil certificates whose only value will be the paper they are printed on.

In the meantime a few will become rich on the exchange. One lady invested a few hundred dollars and within two or three weeks the stock had appreciated to such a figure that she found herself worth something over \$60,000. A chauffeur, who was fined \$50 or three months in jail, for speeding, offered \$40 worth of oil stock in lieu of his fine. The offer was refused and he went to jail. When he was released—he sold his \$40 worth of stock for \$45,000. These cases, out of many, are mentioned merely to show the possibilities, not of the oil business but of gambling in stocks. The man who paid \$45,000 has not yet been heard from. Perhaps he will sell out for \$75,000 or perhaps the bottom will have dropped out of the oil business before he secures a customer, in which case he will be out \$45,000.

Until it comes to the turn of the "last man in" to sell out it does not matter whether there is any oil in the wells or not. The day of reckoning will come eventually, however. When it does the oil, both in quantity and quality will mean everything. This principle holds true in all speculation, whether in oil, real estate or black foxes.

### NOTES

Lord Wemyss, who still felt young when he died at the age of 96 years once explained that the way to keep from growing old was never to forget from invention and discovery. Wemyss began life in the era of the tallow dip, and he left it in the age of the tungsten electric lamp. Tungsten was an unknown metal when he was born, and even when he had passed the allotted threescore and ten electricity was only a laboratory product, so far as human beings had anything to do with it.

The Moose Jaw Times says:—The output of creamery butter in the Province of Alberta has increased from 500,000 pounds to over 1,000,000 pounds in six years. The output of hogs six years ago was 46,000; at the present time it is 60,700. The cattle in this Province during the year 1901 numbered 322,000; in 1913 there were over 1,000,000 head. Very much of the increase is due to the activities of people from the old country who have made their homes in the fertile plains of the Province and have prospered there.

The Confederation suggestion made by Mr. W. S. Louson, in a letter elsewhere in this paper, is well worthy the consideration of the committee in charge of the celebration arrangements. The riflemen of this province have been very much to the front, and often at considerable expense to themselves, in making matters interesting and pleasant both to residents and visitors. That they should have a place in the Confederation Celebration, and that the celebration and what it commemorates should mean something special for them, will be admitted by all. We trust the suggestion will be taken into consideration by the committee and that our riflemen will be given an opportunity to contribute to the success of what will be the greatest celebration in the history of the province.

### LIPTON'S CHALLENGER MEETS HEAVY WEATHER

PLYMOUTH, ENG., July 19.—Shamrock IV., Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America's cup, which sailed from Portsmouth under convoy of the steam yacht Erin, yesterday, put into Plymouth last evening because of stress of weather. The Shamrock was on her way to Falmouth from which port she will start for the United States. The challenger, however, will remain here until the weather shows improvement.
