British Shortage In Bacon

Producers and exporters of Canadian bacon may be interested to learn that the possibility of a shortage of bacon at Christmas and at the time of the Coronation festivities is causing anxiety to the British Government.

King To Visit Canada

Commenting on the announcement that his MAJESTY KING EDWARD proposes to visit the Dominion next year the Toronto Globe says:

He will be the first reigning British Sovereign to be welcomed in the Dominion, though Canada more than once has been host to heirs-apparent and to Royal Princes and Princesses.

His MAJESTY, however, will not come here as a stranger. He will, so to speak, be revisiting a second home, for as Prince of Wales he made five trips to the Dominion at various times.

Should KING EDWARD and his VICEROY appear together in public, naturally the latter—the GOVERNOR-GENERAL—will be relegated to the lower seat, his MAJESTY taking precedence over all his subjects.

It is expected that the KING will, eventually, make a personal appearance in each of the other Dominions, for he is too good a diplomat to risk offending one by appearing to favor another.

He is, of course, setting a precedent—which may or may not be followed by his successors—but that is his MAJESTY's specialty.

Charlottetown was the first to hold live fox shows, and now it is to lead Canada in holding live fox auctions.

Premier Mackenzie King says the League of Nations is a necessity but there is no public opinion in Europe or the United States behind it.

If there is one signally proud with the result of the U.S.A. elections, it is Senator William E. Borah, seventy-one-year-old Republican dean of the United States Senate, who polled the biggest vote of his three decades in public office.

Even Geneva, the seat of the League of Nations, thinks it is time to close down on Communists. The Swiss Federal Council have banned all Communist meetings and other activities by decree, pending parliamentary action on a bill to suppress communist, anarchist, anti-militarist and anti-religious movements in the country.

Pope Pius XI, seeming vigorous, presided Sunday at a lengthy memorial service for four cardinals who had died in the last year. The ceremony coincided with rumors that Professor Amintore Milani, chief Vatican doctor, ten days ago was obliged to carry out a slight blood-letting for the Pontiff, in consequence of a disquieting increase in his blood pressure.

The Republican Party in Florida appears to have lost the rights to have its candidates printed on the ballot at next general election. The vote for President was Roosevelt, 174,880; Landon, 56,276.

Here is a glaring instance of Japanese attempted dumping. Japanese rubber soled canvas shoes were invoiced and entered for duty in New York at 14c per pair. The importers would not pay on any higher valuation, and the case came before Judge Graham in the United States Customs Court who ruled that the import price should be from 50c to 60c per pair, less 10 per cent and 5 per cent discounts.

Canada shortly may become the major source of the world's radium supply, it is stated by Dr. G. C. Laurence, in charge of research work on radium and X-rays for the National Research Council. Canadian radium, he said, successfully had challenged the monopoly of the Belgian Congo and had brought the price down.

Gold production in Canada during 1936 will exceed \$185,000,000 in value, it is stated by Mr. T. A. Crerar, the Dominion's Minister of Mines. For the thirteenth consecutive year, he said, the industry will have established a new record in the value of its output.

Local option entered into the election contests in some States. Nineteen townships in upstate New York voted wet and four dry, while one lost its opportunity to ballot on local option when someone failed to have the question printed on the ballot.

Nazi Germany's Air Minister Goering says that Germany will "break off, finger by finger, the foreign flat" which seeks to throttle the Reich's economic development. The old Prussian mailed flat again.—Ottawa Journal.

Sir John Simon seems at last to have realized that Fascist Jew-baiting in the East End of London, is not, as he blandly imagined, a rather unpleasant joke. The decision to reinforce the police in the districts affected will bring to thousands hope of relief from persecution and intimidation.

The civil war in Spain is likely to have a disastrous effect on our Christmas puddings. Usually in September the first shipments of raisins are sent from Valencia, but this year most of the crops have been destroyed by the marching armies and only very small supplies of the fruit will be available.

Chinese women started the coloring of fingernails and toenails several centuries ago and now members of the fair sex in the Flowery Kingdom are dropping the custom as a degenerate habit.

According to a report from our New York correspondent, there are persistent rumours in that city of a large loan soon to be floated, presumably in London, for the benefit of Germany; and a remark recently made by Mr. Montague Norman about the shrinkage of the turnover in the bill market has served with some people as an excuse for a renewed agitation in favour of granting fresh credits to Germany.

In a letter to the secretary-general of the league, Herr Greiser has protested against what he considers a lack of politeness. His chief, but not his only complaint, is that, as president of the Danzig senate, he was not given adequate notice of the council's discussion of Danzig affairs. Herr Greiser will be remembered as the gentleman who by his behavior at a previous meeting of the council, gave new life to the old phrase "cocking a snook."

So far there has been no more than a beginning, though a determined beginning, in British rearmament, and Mr. Chamberlain's forecast in his Budget speech of an acceleration in scale and in cost is certain to be fulfilled.

By James W. Barton, M.D. TREATMENT OF VARICOSE VEINS AND ULCERS

One of the discouraging sights about hospitals just a few years ago was the number of cases of middle-aged and elderly men and women with varicose veins and varicose ulcers.

Some of them had been in hospital for many months. This was before the value of injecting varicose veins was fully known. This simple injection method not only gets rid of these enlarged and thickened veins but helps to clear up the varicose non-healing ulcers so often present.

These varicose conditions are common amongst all classes of the community, and give rise to a large amount of discomfort, pain, and disability, and, on account of the complications of phlebitis (inflammation of the vein), skin inflammation, and ulceration, lead to a great deal of crippling and ill-health.

At the same time recent experience has shown first, that although the greatest credit is due to injection methods, they must be carried out patiently and efficiently; and secondly, that treatment by operation is still required in a small proportion of cases.

Dr. Reginald T. Payne, St. Bartholomew's Hospital, London, describes his experience and the methods used in over 1000 personal cases in the British Medical Journal.

"Unfortunately it is only too true that nothing is known as to the cause of varicose disorders although varicose disorders grow progressively worse." The introduction of the injection method has overshadowed the operation method but experience has shown that there are definite conditions where operation is still the best method.

Some of the observations made by Dr. Payne are: 1. A family history of varicose veins was present in 50 percent of the cases.

2. Varicose diseases are invariably progressive, arrest is unusual, and natural cure is rare. 3. Operation is the best method of treatment where the veins are of such colossal size that the discomfort and length of time necessary by the injection method is out of the question.

4. Small recent varicose ulcers heal quite rapidly with injection of the veins and the application of a calamine dressing to the ulcer. Larger and older ulcers with hard swollen tissue surrounding them respond rapidly to injection treatment combined with use of elastoplast. The injections should be carried out at fortnightly intervals at the time when the elastoplast is changed.

POTATO PRICES

Sir:—In Tuesday's issue comment was made on the present price of potatoes but you overlooked mentioning that this price of 65c per bushel was for No. 1 Certified Cobblers f.o.b. station. We understand that the price delivered Charlottetown or other loading ports is 3c per bushel over this price.

The American Government Crop Estimate issued on Tuesday shows an increase of ten million bushels over last month's estimate when the trade in general felt that no increase would be shown in the present month's estimate and possibly a decrease. The increase in this month's estimate brings the present year's estimate up to 332,000,000 bushels which is only 21,000,000 bushels short of the estimate for the corresponding month last year.

It remains to be seen whether the increase in this month's estimate will adversely affect present prices on potatoes. The fact, however, that the trade in general were anticipating a decrease is almost certain to cause an easier market for the time being at least.
