At the bottom of Great Saffron hill, London, is situated what at one time was one of the most hideous and dangerous slums. It is part of a ruinous old tenement, exactly answering to the description of the infamous den to which the Artful Dodger led Oliver Twist as a new pal for a visit to "Greenland." The den had several ominous looking staircases leading into dark and ill-smelling passages and had plenty of cupboards available for thieves' booty.

From the outhouses any of the light-fingered gentry could easily have dropped into the street, while the adjacent house, condemned by the London City Council, was easily accessible. The last named tenement, formerly a haunt for vagrants, with all the conveniences of a thieves' kitchen, had associations of the worst kind and has not come under the ban of the London Parliament a moment too soon.

Fagin was a real character, named Isaac Touch, who, when raided by the police, was found to possess a peck measure of watches. He had the name of being a confederate in worse crimes than training young thieves and buying stolen property.

Sir Archibald Geikie.
Sir Archibald Geikie, the newly-elected Secretary of the Royal Society, who takes Sir Michael Foster's place, is the best-known British, and it might almost be said the most eminent European, geologist. He is a fellow of the Royal Societies of London and Edinburgh, and a correspondent of the Institute of France, and of innumerable foreign Academies. He is the author of numerous geological memoirs in the publications of scientific societies, and his many works on geology began with "The Story of a Boulder," as long ago as 1858. Director-General of the Scottish Survey, the first occupant of many great chairs of geology, and director-general of the Geological Survey of the United Kingdom, and of the Geological Museum, there is hardly any honor which science, in Sir Archibald Geikie's branch of it, has bestowed that he has not already received.

Concentrated Wealth.
One-twelfth of the estimated wealth of the United States is represented at the meeting of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation when all the directors are present. They also represent 200 other companies operating one-half of the railroad mileage in the country and control corporations whose aggregate capitalization is \$9,000,000.—World's Work.

alert. The blood again coursed rapidly through the clogged arteries. He walked; yea, the sick man walked. He was healed by being placed, a hopeless, helpless invalid, at the feet of Jesus Christ.

Sickness has been a spiritual blessing to you, O man, as the palsy was to the invalid of old. It has placed you almost within touch of our Saviour and King. For years and years you did not know what a pain meant. When you heard people complaining about their invalidism you had no sympathy. You would petulantly say, "Nine-tenths of these so-called invalids are mere hypochondriacs. If men and women would only get up and stop their complaining and stop dosing themselves with medicines they would be all right." When a minister in church would preach from the text, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee," you would settle back in your seat and smile. You would say to yourself: "Perhaps. Perhaps not. My ancestors were all long-lived. I guess I will be also." Then you would complacently pat your chest as you expanded your lungs three or four inches, and you would say: "Well, my ancestors never had a finer breathing apparatus than I have. Perhaps I shall die to-night. Perhaps not."

But two years ago there came that sudden attack of illness. It came all without any warning at all. You remember how your chest became as white as that of a corpse and your lips turned blue and cold. You remember how that pneumonia stabbed at your lungs, or how that typhoid made you sink so low that for weeks and weeks you hovered between life and death. You remember how asthma choked you until it seemed as though you would go mad with the agony. Aye, that sickness made out of you a changed man.

When the minister now announces the text, Luke, twelfth chapter and twentieth verse, "Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee," you do not flippantly say: "Perhaps. Perhaps not." You know it is not out of the range of possibilities that this night you may be brought face to face with God at the judgment seat of Christ. O man, even while I speak to-day all the good and the bad of your past life are flying swiftly or than the winds through your seething brain. Aye, they are flying as swiftly as the panorama of bygone years in a second of time moves before the vision of a drowning man. Your past sicknesses have changed your feelings toward God. The pain at your heart is warning you that judgment, while every secret thing, whether it be good or whether it be evil." This day—aye, this very minute—on account of that past sick bed, "thou art not far from the kingdom of God."

We all marvel at the wonderful ability of observation to which the trappers and the hunters of old were able to train their visual powers. For days and weeks the Indian scouts were able to follow their enemies across the western prairies. By the twisted blades of grass and by other minute signs they were able to tell how many Indians were in the war party ahead, how many horses and cattle and squaws and papooses. During the Austro-Prussian war in 1866 Archduke Joseph of Austria was warned of an imminent night attack by a gypsy soldier who was able to foresee the advance of the pursuing hosts by watching the birds fly over the Austrian encampment. This soldier said to Prince Joseph: "Your Highness, birds sleep as well as men. These birds would not be flying about at this time of night if they had not been disturbed. The enemy in large numbers is marching through the woods and has frightened them. There will soon be fighting on our front lines." But, though hunters and trappers have almost miraculous seeing powers in reference to the natural world, it does not take an inspired vision to see that we are now living in a time of great religious awakening. How else can you account for the thousands who, as converts, are giving their hearts to Jesus Christ under the connected labors of the evangelistic committees of the Presbyterian Church? How else can you account for the wonderful meetings of Campbell Morgan in America and of Torrey and Alexander in Australia and England, and the crowded schools for Bible study in Winona and Northfield and Chautauque and Moody's Institute of Chicago? Everywhere the vital question is upon every lip, "What shall I then do with Jesus, who is called the Christ?" Like Pilate before the Jewish people, you must decide the question in reference to Jesus. You must decide for Christ or against Christ. And in bringing you up to this question I cannot be far wrong in stating that "thou art not far from the kingdom of God."

The last time Dwight L. Moody ever preached was at a great series of meetings being held in Convention Hall, Kansas City. Suddenly he broke down, and the doctors told him he must stop work at once. They bundled the great evangelist up and started him east for his Northfield home. But, though the doctors could silence his tongue, they could not keep still his pen. When they carried him to Northfield, with his weak fingers he wrote out a telegram to his Kansas City friends who were carrying on the meetings in his stead. His telegram went something like this: "Mr. So-and-so, Kansas City: Have reached home safely. Regret exceedingly being forced to leave. Had I been with you to-night I would have preached on, 'Thou art

not far from the kingdom of God.' My prayer is that many may be led into the kingdom under Mr. Torrey's preaching." Oh, my friends, the redeemed lips of the sainted evangelist are pleading with you from this text in this service to-day. That same divine power which brought thousands and tens of thousands of sinners to the fountain of eternal life is pleading with you to come to Christ, even now while great multitudes are seeking him. Like King Agrippa, are you going to be "almost persuaded" and lost? Or like Paul, the "chief of sinners," are you to be coronated and to have a seat upon a throne in heaven with Jesus Christ?
