Cr. w Returned to S.S. Thistlemore

HIGHLAND LIGHT, Mass., Feb. 11.—The 18 members of the crew of the Furness Line freighter Thistlemore, aground on Peaked Hill bars, who were taken off yesterday, rejoined the captain and the rest of the crew on the stranded vessel late today. The vessel was resting easily, and it had been intended to make an attempt to float her if weather conditions had been favorable. A thick snow at high tide, tonight, however, upset the plan. Constguards said an attempt would be made to float the steamer tomorrow. The vessel was being bled in several places but it was believed that she would not suffer much overnight unless the weather should become worse. The freighter went aground late on Tuesday during a storm.

HOUSES JAPANESE LIVE IN

The most common type of buildings in the Tokio slums is a low building with a tin roof and consisting of two parallel rows of dis-connecting rooms opening into an alley on either side. There may be any number of these buildings therefore a corresponding number of alleys. The alleys vary in width from six to nine feet. They are common grounds for passage, washing, cooking and play of the children. Occasionally there is an open space where there has been a fire or a building removed and here the little boys gather in crowds to play. A little girl is seldom seen at play among them. The most miserable of all houses are the two-story buildings. There is one in New York, north of Anahim, one at Rysenji machi, Shitaya, and one at Nakagome, Narishira, cho, Honjo. These two story buildings are nothing but misery piled on misery. The occupants are robbed of the sun and the houses are wholly unsuited for the primitive way the people have to live and cook their food.

A bride of 83 alighted briskly from a beribboned wedding coach at the Gimsby Registry office (England) amid the cheers of the onlookers, assisted by the bride- room of \$1, also brisk. George Woods, whose third matrimonial alliance it is, was the happy man and the lady was Sarah Horn, who for 30 years has been a widow. The eldest of her 19 children is a daughter aged 60. Smilingly the bride said, "I will" briskly, but the bridegroom appeared somewhat nervous. Their romance was told afterwards in an interview for many years Mrs. Horn has managed Mr. Woods's household. Recently her daughter suggested that she should retire and come to live with her. Dreading such a domestic arrangement, Mr. Woods at once proposed to his house- keeper and the ceremony was the result. "I like being a wife and can wash and cook as well as ever," said the new wife. MONCTON, Feb. 11.—J. B. A. Bennett, whose 12 year old son Fred has been missing from his home here since Tuesday morning last, received word this afternoon that his son was safe in Adamsville, Kent county. The boy walked all the way to Adamsville by the railway track, a distance of some thirty miles.

CURIOS TIMEPIECES OF THE OLDEN DAYS.

The fragile watch of the dainty pattern and design, which today is a favorite among the women, is in striking contrast to some of the watches which were famous several centuries ago. Many of these were of enormous size and of the most ornate design. Mary Queen of Scots was the possessor of a diamond watch which was set with silver gilt and most elaborately ornamented. The face of the skull bore the symbols of death, the scythe and hourglass placed between a palmetto and a wreath of olive. The dial was of the grain of the wood. At the back of the skull was Time, destroying all things, and at the top of the dial was the Garden of Eden. The watch was opened by reversing the skull, placing the upper part of it in the hollow of the hand and lifting the jaw by the hinge, this part being enriched by cut-glass representations of the Holy Trinity, angels and shepherd boys with their flocks. The works of the watch formed the brains of the skull, and were within a scabbard which acted as a musical envelope which, while the dial plate was in the place of the palate. The curious work of art was made at Blois and, at her death, was bequeathed by Mary Queen of Scots to her maid of honor, Queen Seton, in 1571. It afterward came into the possession of Sir John Dick Lander. Another skull watch, which once belonged to Mary Queen of Scots, by its inscription and date, 1560, shows that Francis II. of France presented it to his young wife many years before watches were supposed to have been brought to England from Germany. Queen Mary was evidently a collector of watches of unique design. She is said to have possessed one in a case of crystal, shaped like a coffin, and another made at Rouen, in which a thread of catgut supplied the place of a chain. Some of the early watches were so small as to be set in the hoop of walking sticks, the clasp of bracelets, or in pendants, and there is a record of a striking watch, which was mounted in a ring, in the year 1542. At the Strawberry Hill sale Onezou Victrola purchased a little clock of brass gilt which had been presented to Anne Boleyn by Henry VIII. upon their marriage in 1532. It is richly chased and engraved and is still at Windsor Castle. The clock placed in one of the towers at the palace assumption Court in 1551 is said to be the oldest English make clock extant. When in action it shows the motions of several of the planets. The original dial and several of the wheels attached to the back of the dial still remain.

Mercantile Marine Co. Tonnage

The total tonnage of the International Mercantile Marine Company will pass the 500,000 figure in May according to the announcement made yesterday at the office 1 Broadway. Of this amount 320,000 tons will be under the White Star flag and the remainder will be under those of the Red Star, Leyland and American Lines.

Two ships of the White Star will have a gross tonnage of more than 80,000 tons. They are the Majestic 56,000 tons the world's largest ship and the Homeric, 33,526 tons the world's largest twin screw ship. They will operate with the Olympic this summer in the New York, Cherbourg and Southampton service. The New York, Liverpool and Queensland weekly service will be operated by the four liners Adriac 24,541 tons; Baltic 23,876 tons; Cedric 21,073 tons; and Celtic 21,026 tons.

Two new liners of 16,000 tons gross each, the Doric and the Republic, will be placed on the White Star Dominion line between Montreal and Quebec and Liverpool with the Megantic and the Canada. In addition two new steamships for third class travel, the Vedic and the Rimouski will be put on the Canadian service. The Philadelphia, Queenstown and Liverpool service will be operated by the new 16,000 ton liner Pittsburgh and the Haverford. These vessels will also call at Boston. The White Star service to the Mediterranean will also be maintained by the Arabic of 17,324 gross tons and the Canopic and Celtic.

A new 25,900 ton liner is being constructed for the opening of the Atlantic Transport service for passengers between New York and London and will be ready for the opening of the season in the spring of 1923. Officials of the International Mercantile Marine Company said yesterday that they expect the coming summer to be a record one for ocean travel from America, because the increase in fares over pre war rates will be more than balanced by the high rate of exchange for United States currency in Europe.

Fire Losses

Fire losses in Canada during the week ended February 11, are estimated by The Monetary Times at \$1,163,800, compared with \$244,500, the previous week.

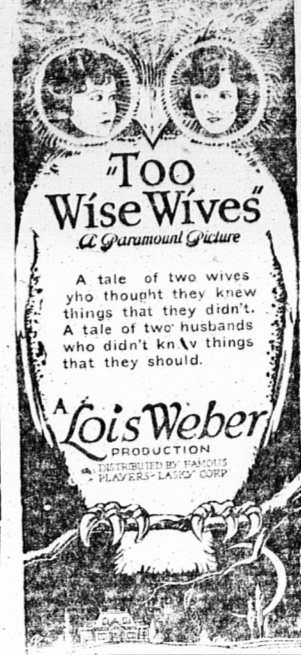
