Seasons, if probably cared for. When the sealer is opened, the ring should be washed, dried and stored away in a cool dark cupboard. When preserving, keep a saucupart of boiling water on the stove and put into it not more than four rings at a time. The boiling water causes the rubber to expand a little, and also destroys any spores of moulds which will most certainly be present on the rings. When only a few rings are immersed at a time, they are not in the water long enough to be harmed by the heat.

Bake the sealers: No matter how well the sealer and the top are washed and dried, mould spores are sure to be on them. But if the sealers and tops are stacked in the sun and the heat gradually raised

to baking point, the spores will be killed. In an
