A representative of the Guardian, had the pleasure yesterday of seeing the fur cleaning-plant of Mr. Rombough in operation. Mr. Rombough has on hand quite a large assortment of fox pelts, some of them finished and ready for the buyer, others ready to be put through the process, giving the visitor an opportunity to see the change effected. It is not too much to say, briefly, and this has been corroborated by the leading fur men of Charlottetown, that the process enhances the value of the pelt anywhere from twenty five to fifty per cent. The pelt in its original raw state is matted, coarse and greasy looking; cleaned by this process it is a thing of beauty, clean, soft, fluffy and, as far as fur attractiveness goes, ready to grace a lady's neck. When it is remembered that it is the raw, uncleaned pelt that the rancher sells the advantage to him of having its value enhanced before selling is obvious. Not even an expert can tell the value of a raw pelt, the buyer knows the possibility of buying it in its

unattractive state at the lowest figure he can, has it cleaned in New York or St. Louis or London and reaps the benefit of the enhanced value. Here is where the unsophisticated rancher loses anywhere from a hundred to three hundred dollars on every uncleaned pelt he sells and it was to avoid this and to be in a position to get full value for a pelt that Mr. Rombough inaugurated this plant, specially for his own use. Charlottetown fur dealers, seeing the advantages of such a process, invited him to enlarge his plant to enable him to do the work for them. This he has done and he now has a plant that can clean all the pelts raised in the province and it is safe to say that if all the island pelts go through his hands before reaching the buyer it will mean many thousands of dollars, not to the buyer but to the original owner and seller. Mr. Rombough is an experienced furrier having been in the business in New York and Baltimore from boyhood until four years ago when he came to this province, attracted by the possibilities of the fox business. He was connected with one of the largest manufacturing concerns in the United States for over ten years, making regular yearly visits to Paris in connection with the designing of fur and other garments. Being an expert in fur values he saw the need of properly finishing pelts before offering them for sale and in the preparation of his own furs for market he has already saved more than the cost of his plant which is built and operated on the plans adopted by the fur-houses in New York and other fur centres. The process of cleaning is dry, hardwood sawdust blown by electrically driven fans into the fur for a specified number of minutes and blown out again, the pelt coming through, as far as the fur is concerned, ready to wear. Every rancher in the province who purchases selling one or more pelts should bring them first to Mr. Rombough and the Guardian undertakes to say that it will mean many dollars saved to the man who has the right to the full value, namely the original owner.
