AUTHORS' MISTAKES.

LONDON, July 22. Writers wise in the great things of life have frequently made mad mistakes in details involving some technical point on which they were ignorant. Some of these are most amusing. For instance, Sir Walter Scott in "The Children of Gibbon," caused a new moon to rise in the east at two in the morning. It is the old moon that rises in the morning. The new moon appears in the western sky, and sets soon after the sun.

Another author who went astray frequently with respect to his moon was Rider Haggard. In King Solomon's Mines he tells of an eclipse of the new moon, an astronomical impossibility.

The "Penny Dreadful" Thackeray speaks of Mohammed's soldiers cutting off the heads of all prisoners refusing to acknowledge that there was only one prophet of God. As a matter of fact, however, Mohammedans profess belief in all the prophets of the Bible—Noah, Abraham, Moses, Jesus—but they believe that Mohammed is the greatest. A critic once accused Thackeray for his mistake; for he was a great reader of Gibbon.

In "The Virginians" Chaplain Sampson is unlawfully arrested for debt on the English law which could not be. An old offender like Sampson could probably have known this much of the law, and would hardly have accepted the situation with the resigned query, "At whose suit, Simons?"

The elder Dumas, although he had only a superficial knowledge of toxicology, was fond of introducing into his romances poisons unknown to science, whose instantaneous and deadly effect was startling to say the least. Science recognizes only one poison—that commonly called prussic acid—which possesses anything like the immediate effect so loved by the romancer.

Again, Dumas was mistaken in his description of complete paralysis, as exemplified in old Norrier, who, unable to move or speak, yet maintained an unimpaired his intellectual faculties, and was able to wink his eyes in agreed fashion to communicate his thoughts and desires to his family. Physicians have frequently pointed out the impossibility of such a pathological condition.—Edinburgh "Boottman."
