OTTAWA, April 5 (CP) - A special scholarship of \$1,000 to work on food shortage problems has been awarded J. A. Pearce of Regina, the National Research Council announced today.

Twelve students were awarded fellowships of \$750, 20 studentships of \$650 and 21 bursaries of \$250. Bursaries are given in co-operation with Canadian universities and details of these awards are yet to be completed.

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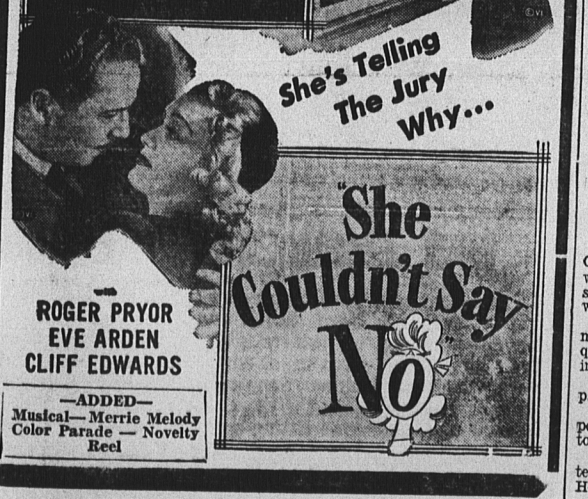
