FOR THE BOYS IN FRANCE.—As far as loving thoughts, careful consideration and an abundance of gifts can make it, this Christmas will be a merry and happy one for the gallant boys in France. SERIOUS FIRE.—The dredge Edward Hall, No. 1 was burned to the water's edge yesterday, and is now a total loss. The fire started about 5 o'clock yesterday morning, the cause of the outbreak being unknown. She underwent repairs a few weeks ago at L. M. Poole & Co's wharf, preparatory to beginning dredging operations at York Point. The Hall was a dipper dredge, drawing the dredge into a dip. She was valued at about \$50,000. FIELD KITCHEN ORDERED.—Yesterday the committee of the P. E. I. Students' Gift Fund placed their order for a Field Kitchen with the McClary Mfg. Company. This Field Kitchen will be similar to one supplied to Col. Dansereaux, of Montreal, for the 69th Battalion French Canadian Regiment by the Canada Rubber Company, and to Lieut. Col. Hay of the 52nd Battalion by the people of Fort William, and which have proved satisfactory. This Field Kitchen will be presented to the Highland Regiment now in training here and it is hoped that it will be here for presentation before Christmas. It will on arrival, be exhibited in one of the large show-rooms and later on the plate with the Company's name will be placed on it. This Kitchen, which is of the latest design, will place the Highland Regiment here on the same footing as in the case of Canada and will be most convenient. The Students' Fund is coming along nicely but one hundred dollars is still needed to complete the cost of this first Field Kitchen.

THE CAT THAT CAME BACK.

The story of a notable journey of a cat from Kingston, Surrey, to its former home at Glastonbury, in Somersetshire, a distance of about 133 miles is now told by an astonished correspondent.
In April last a cat, mottled gray and described as half Persian in breed, was sent to Glastonbury, where it had been reared, to the Matron of the Kingston Nursing Home. It was sent in a packing case drilled with air holes and obviously the animal had no opportunity of marking the points of its journey. Soon after its arrival at Kingston the cat was lost and despite the most diligent searching, no trace of it could be found.
The matron of the nursing home has now received a letter from Glastonbury stating that the cat has found its way back to its old home. It arrived emaciated and footsore and apparently had walked the whole of the 133 miles.
The letter describes the cat on its arrival as "a mere shadow of its former self" and expresses the belief that although terribly weak through its wanderings, it can be nursed back to a healthy condition.—London Chronicle.
