A VALUABLE PRIZE CONTEST

The Charlottetown Guardian has secured the right to use the International Newspaper Bible Study Club Lessons each week for the term of one year, commencing with the lesson for August 23rd, 1908. But one paper in each town can use these. The Guardian takes pleasure in being able to present to its readers such a valuable help along the lines of Bible study. They will be published each week in the Morning Daily and the Rural Daily. Only paid-in-advance subscribers to either paper are eligible to join this club. There is no fee for entrance, and no conditions other than those stated below. Everybody stands the same chance and has the same opportunity to get the valuable prize without the investment of a cent. There is one condition that must in every case be complied with and that is, that every one entering the contest must be a regular subscriber as above.

GOLD AND SILVER MEDALS, BIBLES, BOOKS.

Persons may join the club at any time during the year, but must, of course, answer the 52 questions hereinafter explained, to qualify for the prizes. It is however, desirable that the questions be answered as the lessons are studied.

The International Newspaper Bible Study Club is for the purpose of promoting a wider study of the Bible, the sacred truths of Christianity, and the problems which enter into every man's life. It is composed of all those who join a Local Club, and take up the study course herein outlined bearing City ordained clergymen. Although with their sympathies we co-operate, it is not considered fair to have them compete for the prizes. It is however desirable that the Class scholars, and church goers generally, may belong to this newspaper Club, also non-churchgoers, of all shades of opinion. All such who have not joined are warmly invited to do so and compete for the prizes.

The Guardian has secured the right to publish the International Sunday School Lessons by Rev. Dr. Lanscott, D.D., which have aroused so much interest elsewhere, and they will appear weekly. One of these questions each week is to be answered in writing, and upon these answers the prizes are to be awarded.

The Guardian is authorized to form a Local Newspaper Bible Study Club for its readers, and guarantee to all who join and fulfil the conditions, that everything here promised shall be faithfully carried out.

CONDITIONS OF THE CONTEST.

1. Each contestant, or his or her family, must be a paid-in-advance subscriber to The Guardian during the continuance of the contest, in order to qualify for membership in the International Newspaper Bible Study Club and the Local Club.

2. Each contestant in this Local Club must answer each of the written questions for 52 consecutive weeks, commencing for Sunday, August 23rd and the answers must be in possession of this paper within two weeks of the close of this period, which allows two weeks grace after the close of the contest.

3. Each question must be answered separately, and the paper written on one side only. No answer must contain more than two hundred words and may be less. It will be a convenience if students will write their answers on letter paper, about 8 1/2 inches by 11 inches.

4. Each answer must have the name and address of the writer at the bottom of the answer, together with the date label of a current issue of The Guardian so it can be identified, giving a number, registered, and then the name will be set off so the examiner may know it by number only.

5. Students should be careful to understand the question before answering. To do this the lesson text must be read and especially the verse or verses, upon which the question is based.

6. The answers from this Local Club must be delivered to The Guardian office, and they will be collected at the close of the contest and forwarded to headquarters for independent examination by competent examiners. The prizes will then be awarded according to the highest number of marks won by members of The International Newspaper Bible Study Club, and prizes which may be awarded to members of this local Club will be given out from this office.

THE PRIZES.
First Series—A gold medal to each of the first five contestants.
Second Series—A silver medal to each of the next five contestants.
Third Series—A Teacher's Bible, price \$5.50, to each of the next five contestants.
Fourth Series—The book "The Heart of Christianity," price \$1.50 to each of the next thirty-five contestants.
Fifth Series—A developed mind, an expanded imagination a richer experience and more profound knowledge of the Bible and of life, to all who take this course whether winning any other prize or not.

Each medal will be suitably engraved, giving the name of the winner and for what it is awarded, and in the like manner each Bible and book will be inscribed.

All who can write, and have ideas, are urged to take up these studies regardless of the degree of their education, as the papers are not valued from an educational or literary standpoint, but from the point of view of the cogency of their reasoning ideas.

Suggestive Questions.

Temperance Lesson.
Isaiah v: 11-23.
Golden Text—Wine is a mocker strong drink is raging. Prov. xxi:1.
Verse 11—How many men do you

know in this community whose moral portrait is drawn in this verse; that is, those who are habitual drunkards?

Are there still those whose chief ambition is to get drunk? What are the chief "woes" of the drunkard (1) To himself (2) To his family (3) To the community?

Verse 12—Is it a fact that drinking men still like string music, and, is so how do you account for it? Is it either possible or probable that a man given to drink, can also "regard the work of the Lord"?

Verse 13—Upon which kind of knowledge does the prosperity of an individual, or of a people, most depend—moral and spiritual, or scientific and commercial? What was the general cause for the various captivities, and national misfortunes of ancient Israel?

Verse 14—To what extent does the longevity of an individual, or of a nation, depend upon moral conduct?

Can the "glory and the multitude" and the men who "rejoice" be increased most in this country with liquor being freely sold, or under prohibition?

Verse 15—If a "mean" man, that is one of poor ability and little influence indulges in drink, and if a "mighty" man, that is one of great ability and influence, indulges in drink, what will be the effect of such indulgence, and will there be any difference in the effect upon the two men?

Verse 16—In what respect are the "judgments" and the "righteousness" of God "exalted," or seen in the terrible results of the liquor traffic?

Verse 17—What is the difference in the economic results of money made by farming and money made in the liquor traffic?

Verse 18—Is it ever possible for good personal results to come from bad deeds?

Is there any need to experiment with or put to the test, the moral precepts of the Bible, seeing they are based upon the experience of mankind and the wisdom of the ages?

Is it ever possible for a man or nation to escape the natural results of wrong doing? (This question must be answered in writing by members of the club.)

Verse 20—If a man does that which is essentially wrong, and he thinks it is right, does his opinion change the natural results of the act? For illustration, a mother gives her babe, in the night, prussic acid, thinking it to be castor oil.

Verse 22—How should we estimate the moral character of those who sell intoxicating liquor as a beverage for Sunday, Oct. 4th, 1908—David Brings the Ark to Jerusalem—17 Sam. vi.
