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Hawboldt Wins N. Sydney Race

NORTH SYDNEY, N. S., Aug. 5.—James Hawboldt, of Westville, won the road race here this afternoon staged in connection with the Cape Breton summer carnival, which opened at North Sydney today. Reid Ross, of Sydney, was second, a few yards behind.

The seven and a half mile road race was the feature of the afternoon. Hawboldt led for the greater part of the race, but was closely pressed at all times by Reid Ross, who finished about ten feet behind the Westville runner. Hawboldt's time for the distance was 41 minutes, 36 seconds.

Suzanne Lenglen Will Be Alone In Pro. Tennis Game

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—Suzanne Lenglen apparently is doomed to disappointment if she has any idea of opposing leading women players when she comes here as a professional in the fall. None of the ranking stars have any thought of leaving amateur ranks and automatically bar them from meeting the French woman otherwise.

Mrs. Molla Mallory, former national champion, who had been mentioned as a likely opponent for Mile Lenglen declared she would not turn professional to do so. The national title holder, Miss Helen Wills, as well as such other women stars as Miss Eleanor Goss, Miss Mary K. Browne and Miss Florence Ballin also made it clear they would not forsake amateur ranks. Miss Elizabeth Ryan declined to comment on her attitude.

Canada's Attitude

TORONTO, Aug. 5.—There will be nothing to prevent Canadian amateur tennis stars from playing against Suzanne Lenglen when the French amateur comes to Canada on her North American tour, so long as they receive no remuneration, G. H. Meldrum, President of the Canadian Lawn Tennis Association, stated today.

According to the interpretation of the International Lawn Tennis Federation, to which all countries participating in the Davis Cup matches subscribe, amateurs are prevented from obtaining any pecuniary advantage from the playing of the game, but there is nothing to prohibit an amateur from playing against a professional provided the amateur receives no benefit financially.

After stressing that the Association of which he is president is a purely amateur body and opposed to the introduction of professionalism in every shape and form into the game, Mr. Meldrum stated: "The Council of the Association has not yet considered the situation which will be created if Mile Lenglen proposes to play in Canada, but my own personal view is that as far as the present rules are concerned there does not appear to be any reason why our players, if requested to do so should not appear against her in exhibition matches."

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—The Pirates National League leaders split a double header with the Braves at Boston today, the home team taking the first, 14 to 0, and the world's champions the second, 5-2.

They were aided in their cause by loose fielding displayed by the Pirates, who made five errors. 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Melhorn Suffers Injury In Links

MONTREAL, Aug. 5.—W. E. "Wild" Bill Melhorn, of New York, has probably been eliminated as one of the leading challengers for the Canadian open golf championship, play for which commences tomorrow, and continues Friday and Saturday over the Royal Montreal golf links.

Melhorn suffered a painful injury to his index finger of the right hand, which it is generally thought will force him to scratch his entry. He had hopes tonight that he might be able to start tomorrow.

While many of the competitors went over the championship course today for the final practice, the majority of the more prominent golfers confined their efforts to practicing shots only. The scores on the eve of the tournament on the whole were good, though few were below par figures of 73. One of the surprises was a brilliant 69 turned in by W. Lamb, an assistant pro from Toronto.

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
