LONDON, Aug. 25.—While it is impossible to obtain any definite information, it is generally believed that Italy will soon announce her participation on the side of the allies.

SPYING ANTWERP.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—A despatch from Antwerp says the German Zeppelin airship flew over Antwerp last night.

THE FALL OF NAMUR.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Beyond the bare statement that Namur has fallen, the official bureau has issued nothing on the subject. The Times says the fall of Namur is one of those inexplicable events which make war the gamble that it is. That Namur should have fallen in two days will require a deal of explanation the Times adds.

BRUSSELS INDEMNITY.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—A despatch to the Times from Flushing says that \$4,000,000 towards the war indemnity of \$40,000,000 demanded of the City of Brussels by the Germans already has been paid.

ADRIATIC FLEET.

MILAN, Aug. 25.—A despatch from Cattaro says all the fortifications there have been destroyed by the allies fleets.

THE EMPEROR'S NEPHEW.

PARIS Aug. 25.—A despatch from Courtrai says that the Emperor's nephew has been taken prisoner. He was in command of a detachment of 4,000 men who reached Arras.

NEW GERMAN MOVE.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—The Central News circulates a despatch from Paris, saying that official communication given out in that city declares that German cavalrymen, belonging to an independent division, are operating on the extreme right and on extreme left of the position of the allies.

TUESDAY'S BAD NEWS.

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Yesterday was a day of bad news and we fear more must follow. The London Times says today in an editorial on the fall of Namur: "on the first phase of the great battle." The paper continues: "The Germans appear to have won ground all along the line save in the area held by the British. We were prepared for the ebb and flow of conflict, but not for the fall of Namur." "We have to face this situation with unshaken confidence. We have to remember that the battle is not yet over.

The Germans have not yet burst their way through to France. We have to remember that this is the first great encounter of a war which plainly is destined to be a long one. For the allies it is a phase, for the German, it is vital. They are dealing their blows with utmost vigor but the issue in Belgium still hangs in the balance. In spite of the unfortunate events at Namur. Whatever the upshot Great Britain and her allies will face the outlook with dogged determination and continue the war until the spirit of Prussian militarism is routed out of Europe. Time fights on the side of the allies. With the Germans it is neck or nothing. The French and English have everything to gain by waiting a wearying war.

While the issue remains uncertain, we may still maintain stoutest hopes. Should it go against us we may remember that the allies have not like Germany, staked all upon their first venture. Our ultimate success is certain and we will never sheath our sword until Germany has been finally beaten to her knees.

EMPRESS' SAFE HOISTED.

QUEBEC, Aug. 24.—Divers of the Canadian Salvage, who are working on the sunken Empress of Ireland, have succeeded in getting the purser's safe hoisted and hoisted to the deck of the steamer from which they are working.

THE JAPANESE BOMBARDMENT OF THE GERMAN PENINSULA.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 25.—The Japanese battleship Satsuu opened the bombardment of Tsing Tao at 12:15 Sunday, according to reliable information secured here. In the attacking Japanese squadron are also said to have been the battleships Aki, Satsuma and Kashima, together with a number of other vessels. The Amakusa is reported to have mined the entrance to the harbor on Saturday night. The Satsuu has a displacement of 20,800 tons and a powerful armament, including twelve 12-inch guns. The Aki, Satsuma and Kashima are all formidable vessels, though less powerful than the Satsuu. The Amakusa is a mine-layer that was captured from the Russians at Port Arthur in 1905.

750,000 BAGS OF CANADA'S FLOUR GIFT NOW ON SEA.

OTTAWA, Aug. 25.—Three-fourths of Canada's gift of flour to Great Britain is on the ocean. The sub-committee of the Government which had charge of the purchase and shipment of fodder and other supplies ordered by the War Office has completed arrangements for the transportation of all those supplies and the bulk of the flour, oats and hay has already been shipped. The flour is on its way to London and will be followed almost immediately by the remaining 250,000 bags, making up the Canadian gift. It is understood that the oats and the hay for the use of the British cavalry and artillery horses, are being sent direct to Havre. The Government does not anticipate that these cargoes will be subjected to any interference in transit as they are advised that the ocean lane has been cleared of the enemy's ships.
