and I would advise the members of the opposite side of this House to take it as quietly and peacefully as possible, for they have brought this criticism upon themselves.

A great future was looked up by the Government about the alleged conditions of the schools when they came into power. We have been repeatedly told by the members of the Government and by their press that there were one hundred (100) schools vacant in the Province at that time.

This statement has been revised a number of times; so much so that even the Liberal members themselves have forgotten the story they first told.

It is quite true that during the war our schools came through a trying period. Western Canada was at the very height of its prosperity. They were paying their teachers salaries undreamed of in this country.

Under the Liberals the Experimental Farm was paid for by the Province, and handed over to the Dominion Government.

In regard to the Egmont Bay Exhibition for several years before the Conservatives came into power they received a grant of \$100,000.

They started a School Supply giving the poor people their books at cost. This has been changed into a money-making establishment.

They established the Egg Circles by giving them a credit in the bank of \$20,000.00. What has this Government done for them?

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quite safe to say that the loss through neglect both of roads and bridges will equal the outlays for supposedly permanent roads.

Now I intend to say something about the Agriculture Department—I cannot possibly pass it. My hon. friend from the Second District in the course of his remarks endeavored to impress upon the House and the people generally that the present Government has done everything that has been done for the farmers of the country.

They started Domestic Science They started the Women's Institutes. They started Short Courses. They started School Fairs and the teaching of Nature Study.

They had three School Inspectors under the Agriculture Grant whose duty it was to attend to the nature study in our schools. They were instrumental in getting the Agricultural Grant from Ottawa, and they were successful in securing it in such a way that we received a larger portion than we would have under the original plan.

The public generally are well aware of the condition of Falconwood Farm, previous to the year 1911. How disease was rampant. A large number of the animals had to be slaughtered previous to that year.

The question involved the measure of protection extended to our farmers, both in the matter of selling our native horses and in the safeguarding of the health of those that have.
