Ingenious River Transport

An invaluable aid to cross-country movements of troops has been perfected by machine-guns in a New Brunswick unit stationed at an outpost of the Atlantic Command. The ingenious soldiers merely use their rifles, haversacks and other equipment and construct a serviceable raft, with the tarpaulin from their platoon truck as the outer surface. On this raft can be floated a 100-pound Vickers gun, hundreds of rounds of ammunition and other supplies to make a safe river crossing.

The photo shows the raft under construction, which takes about 25 minutes and lever picture shows five other soldiers who volunteered to demonstrate the way the raft is pushed across the river.
