We were speaking of the changes that have come to women in the last quarter of a century. Perhaps the greatest of them all is the change in woman's own place in the world.



A respectable woman was not supposed to have any ambitions and one who followed any sort of career was looked at askance.

Behold the change. Nowadays every girl expects to be financially independent just as much as a boy does.

Life is just as full of opportunities for sister as it is for brother. She can do pretty much everything that he can do and a lot of things that he can't.

Then there is woman's changed attitude toward marriage. To grandmother the altar was the supreme goal, and, failing to reach it, life was condensation and dust.

Undoubtedly, every girl would like to marry, because the mating instinct is one of the primal forces of nature, but behind this urge is no longer the economic necessity, nor the boredom of a life that has nothing in it if it lacks husband and children.

Nor does the girl of today dope herself up on the sickly sentimentality that her grandmother did, nor cast a romantic cloak, embroidered with her maiden dreams, over the entire masculine sex.

She knows that marriage isn't the beginning of an idyl in which "they lived happily ever after," as the old-fashioned novelist used to say, but that it means for the woman harder work than she ever did before.

Stuffed Egg Salad

6 hard boiled eggs 1-2 teaspoon salt 1-4 teaspoon mustard 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

5 egg whites 1-2 teaspoon salt 3 cups shredded cabbage 1-2 cup French dressing

Peel the eggs and cut in half lengthwise. Remove yolks carefully and mash them with a fork, add seasonings and melted butter, and work until smooth.

Tomato Omelet 6 eggs 1-2 teaspoon salt 1-2 cup milk or water Few grains pepper 3 tomatoes

Watercress Cut the tomatoes in one third inch slices and sprinkle with salt and pepper and saute in hot butter or bacon fat.

The first actual evidence about Capone's income was given by Parker Henderson, Jr., former manager of a Miami Florida hotel. Henderson testified that during a five months stay in Miami, Capone received a total of \$30,000 in telegraphic money orders from Chicago.

Seraubled Eggs With Chives

6 eggs 1-2 teaspoon salt Few grains pepper 3-4 cup thin cream 1 tablespoon minced chives 2 tablespoons butter

Beat eggs, add salt, pepper and cream. Melt the butter in a hot frying pan, pour over in the egg mixture. Reduce the heat and cook very slowly. Sprinkle the chives over the eggs and stir constantly until the mixture is thick and creamy. Remove at once from the fire, turn out on a hot plate, garnish with cream and serve with creamed new potatoes.

APPLE CORNBREAD

2 cups cornmeal, white or yellow. 2 tablespoons sugar. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 3 teaspoons baking powder. 1/4 teaspoon baking soda. 1-2-3 cups milk. 1 egg. 3 tart apples, pared and diced finely.

Mix dry ingredients. Beat egg, add milk and combine mixture. Stir in diced apples, pour into well-greased shallow pan. Bake 30 minutes in hot oven—400 degrees.

NEW YORK, N. Y. Oct 13. (By the Canadian Press)—The Canadian dollar closed at 91 cents on local foreign exchanges yesterday, 1-2 cent higher than Friday's close, after a day of narrow fluctuation during which at no time it went below the 90 mark.

The dollar opened unchanged at 90 1-2 cents yesterday, was quoted slightly higher at 91 cents at noon, and closed firm at that price. The Federal Reserve Bank of New York yesterday reported the receipt of a shipment of gold from Canada amounting to \$486,000.
