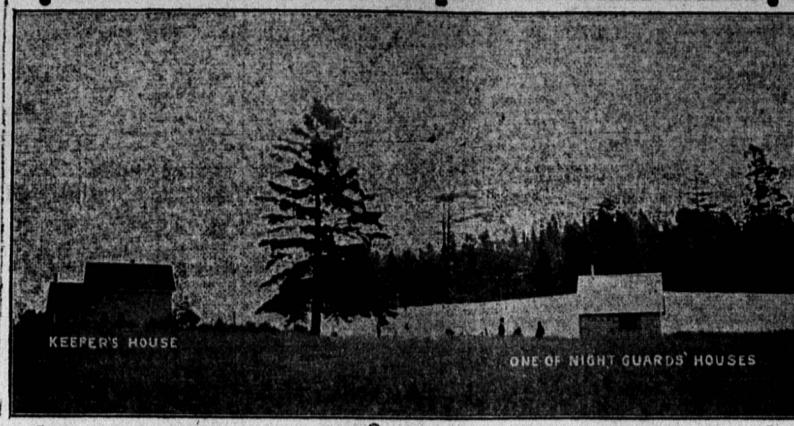


JOHN R. DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES LTD.

Description of Ranch

The chief point of interest for the thousands of tourists who visit Charlottetown is the Dennis farm. It is situated about ten minutes' drive from the city on an eminence overlooking the harbor and consists of one hundred and sixty acres of land. It is chiefly of interest because the fox ranch which occupies ten acres of woodland on the highest point of this farm is the largest in the Province and its owner has the reputation of being the most successful of fox breeders up to the present time.

Situated as it is on a wooded hilltop it is ideally located for a fox home. The natural drainage of the ground is perfect, so that there is no danger of spring freshets so fatal to young foxes. The air is always pure and fresh, for the winds which sweep the hilltop carry away all harmful and disagreeable odors and tumble the chilling fogs into the valley below. The fact that Mr. Dennis has never had a single case of sickness among his animals since he acquired the present ranch (three years ago) is sufficient evidence of the healthfulness of the ranch and surroundings. The ranch has an enviable history of success. Last year seven per cent of the Island's increase of young foxes were born in this ranch. This year Mr. Dennis has raised fifty-eight young foxes. It is not much wonder that he is called the "Wizard Rancher."

Guarding The Dennis Ranch

Standing out prominently is the night watchman's house which overlooks the ranch and the public road. Supplementing the eye of this officer is the vigilance of another watchman whose especial business it is to patrol the ranch. There are brilliant lights surrounding the ranch which are turned on every night to enable the trained night watchman to protect the foxes from disturbance.

The equipment is the largest and most up-to-date in the Province. The pens of the PEDIGREED FOXES number one to eleven and occupy the premier position in the ranch. Every convenience that ingenuity can suggest and money procure has been incorporated in the construction of their dens. Description of Foxes

DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES are regarded as the type, "par excellence" of silver black fox. They are characterized by thin mobile ears; a full neck, short and arched from the back; width over shoulders and through the heart; a long, delicately turned head; a springy pelt, and pink skin covered with a wealth of fine lustrous fur, particularly marked on limbs and under body; and a large heavy "brush". These are the Hall marks of health and vigour.

The foundation stock of the DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES was selected from the pens of the Pioneer Ranchmen, Charles Dalton and R. T. Oulton, Alberton, and from the famous Rayner Ranch, Alberton, Prince Edward Island. The crossing of these two noted strains has produced a beautiful, vigorous, large animal that combines the fine rich lustrous fur of the one breed with the high quality blood and phenomenal productiveness of the other. The pelts of ancestors of some of these foxes sold for the highest prices on the London market.

Besides his sorrowing widow he leaves two sisters Mrs. Frederick Davidson, Burlington, who also 80 years of age attended her brother's funeral driving about 30 miles in all, also Mrs. Robert Weeks, South Granville.
