BRUNSWICK LEIR EXPECTED SHORTLY.

BERLIN, March 12.—Horace Rumbold, Counsellor of the Embassy here, was ordered to-day to Brunswick where the arrival of a heir to the throne is awaited shortly. The young Duke of Brunswick with the Duchess, who was formerly Princess Victoria, Louise of Prussia, and is the only daughter of Emperor William, look up his official residence in Brunswick several months ago. The presence of a British official is in accordance with the ancient custom which renders necessary to certification of the birth of a member of the British Royal family. The Duke is a British prince. The German Empress has already arrived in Brunswick.

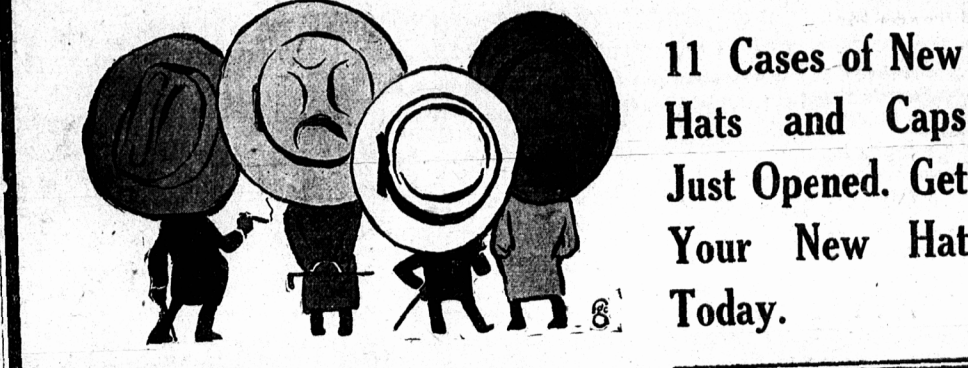
