The Guardian was shown last night the most peculiar achievement in the way of an egg that has ever come to notice. The production may be best described as a Siamese twin egg, as it consists of two small eggs united by a narrow portion. Those who wish may see the curiosity, which will be exhibited in the window of O. E. Rodd's harness shop, Great George Street today. The egg was laid by a hen on Mr. Rodd's farm at North River.

On the editorial page today will be found an announcement regarding another road race which The Guardian has been authorized to make. Those who are moving in this matter are making it a point to contribute prizes of more than usual value and the fact that they are to be at the absolute disposal of the winner after the proposed race is run should induce keen competition. There is evidently great interest in these races and the fact that there are men in Charlottetown who can make 'me' equal to amateurs anywhere makes The Guardian announcement one of importance to all interested in athletics. In an almost continuous drizzle of rain, over a road that was in a very difficult condition for them to make anything like time on, the contestants for The Patriot Road race yesterday evening covered the six miles course between Mt. Herbert and this City. The road in places was so muddy and contained such puddles that the runners had at times to take to the side paths. It is hardly proper that this contest should be looked upon as an indication of what the men could do if the same race should be run under more favorable conditions; but although they regretted the state of the course they made no demur about running; and the resolutions of the officials to decide the race rain or no rain was generally agreed with, considering the number of times the event has had to be postponed. There was a good deal of interest manifested by citizens and as the hour of the arrival of the racers at the finishing point between the Market and the Post Office drew near, many hundreds assembled. They stood in the rain with unabated enthusiasm for half an hour, the majority of them, before the signal of the first man's approach was given. The advent with cheers and after that only a few minutes elapsed before the others who had gone all the distance, arrived. There were ten starters E. J. Arsenault, Colin McNevin, Peter McDonald, Ivan Reddin, H. Harley, Patrick Duffy, James Ferguson, Fred Jenkins, all of Charlottetown; J. Lorne McDougall, Rollo Bay West; and J. Frank McDonald, Tracadie; and they went off at 6.40 promptly. Those who led at the first began at a killing pace, with Peter McDonald and Fred Jenkins leading and keeping in advance by 100 yards until the first mile was covered. McNevin was 8th for the first half mile, but at the end of the first mile had moved to third, followed closely by Reddin and Harley. They ran in that order to Banbury, about half the distance of the course, when McNevin went to the front, and Harley and Reddin passed Jenkins, and very soon after Reddin closed with McDonald and McNevin, and the three ran away from them. On approaching the bridge McNevin increased his lead over McDonald, and the latter was passed by Harley who in traversing the bridge moved up on McNevin who had entered it about 50 yards ahead. Up the hill on the finish, however, McNevin lengthened the springy stride which had led him to the front and left Harley behind while he came in the leader in splendid shape. He is undoubtedly a good runner and his performance was the subject of general admiration by experts in athletics. He is a Y. M. C. A. gymnasium graduate and a member of the Absegweit Athletic Club. The others finished in this order: Harley, McDonald, Reddin, Jenkins, Duffy, J. Frank McDonald, McDougall. There was not much space between the men as they came in.
