The latest news, first of all.

The remains of Miss May B. Hayden, daughter of L. B. Hayden, Elmsdale, who died at Providence, R. I., on the 15th inst, arrived last night by the Empress, accompanied by her brother-in-law L. W. McKinnon, a whose place she died, and were forwarded by the evening train to Elmsdale for burial. The late Miss Hayden was a niece of Capt Geo. McKay, Summerside, and leaves a very large circle of relatives and friends in different parts of the Province, who will lament her demise at the early age of twenty-five years.

Yesterday afternoon at a meeting of quite a few interested parties, which was held at 3.30 in the Artillery Officers' quarters in the Armouries, the Charlottetown Badminton Club was formed. The officers elected were: President, Mrs (Col) Ogilvie; Secretary, Major C. Leigh. These two, with D. B. Stewart, to form a managing committee. It was decided that Wednesday and Saturday afternoons would be Club afternoons, playing commencing about three o'clock and continuing until six. Much interest was shown and the new Club will doubtless be a source of much enjoyment for each individual member.

Today is Old People's Day in connection with the King's Business. Respect for the aged is being shown in every possible way. A committee of ladies, from all churches, has arranged for carriages to call for elderly people at their homes and take them to the special afternoon service in First Methodist church at 3 o'clock. A white flower will be worn today by every man in the city as a mark of respect to father or mother living or dead. Every attention will be given the old folk and certainly this afternoon service will be a great event. The best seats are reserved for them but everybody is invited.

A correspondent writes as follows: The lecture on Tuberculosis delivered by Dr Porter at York on Saturday evening was highly successful. Owing to the short notice given the audience was not as large as would otherwise have been. Attention was drawn to the large death rate due to this disease both in U. S. and Canada. He showed the different ways of infection. These, he said, might be classed under two heads—the direct and indirect—Direct from animals to man by way of infected meat and milk. These were easily overcome by proper cooking of meat and pasteurising of suspected milk. Indirect, from man to man which with proper care were equally as easy to avoid. Speaking of the methods of prevention and cure, and even the worst cases were known to have been cured, the lecturer said that stimulants or change of climate were of no avail but good food, fresh air and rest were the three things that were responsible for the stamping out of this dreaded disease, no Tuberculosis germs being able to survive where those principles were properly looked after. Dr McLaughlin also spoke of the necessity of cleanliness in the matter of disposing of garbage and slop around farm yards where proper sewerage was not obtainable. A vote of thanks, moved by P. Brodie, seconded by Wm Gibson, was tendered the speakers by Dr J. C. McDonald President of the York branch of the Anti-tuberculosis society, who presided. The singing of the National Anthem brought to a close a very interesting and instructive evening.

The attention of the city authorities is directed to a drain on Euston Street where Foxhall Street intersects which has become clogged. Just at the point where the planking extends over the gutter to the street the leaves and other street garbage have been gathering for some days and the gutter is now completely filled, the water being turned aside and is now flowing over the centre of the street. Should a frost come before this obstruction is removed some difficulty might be experienced in keeping the street properly drained.

Sabbath, November 14th, 1909, was a day long to be remembered in the history of St John's Church, Belfast. The Church having undergone extensive repairs it was on that day reopened for the public worship of God. The day from early morning was both gloomy and threatening, but at eleven o'clock, a.m. the large and sacred edifice was filled to its utmost capacity. Rev D. Mackenzie, of Wood Islands, conducted the Gaelic Service, preaching from Ezra VII: 27. His theme was "Beautifying the House of the Lord." Rev D. B. McLeod, Orwell, then followed with an English service, preaching from Luke XIV: 28-31. His subject being the foundation building, costliness and usefulness of the Christian character. Rev S. D. McPhee, the pastor, gave a brief historical sketch of the congregation. It is eighty-five years old. It has enjoyed the ministry of Rev John McLennan, Rev Alex McKay, Rev Alex McLean, Rev A. S. Stewart, Rev A. Maclean Sinclair and Rev S. D. McPhee, at five o'clock p.m., the Rev L. Beaton, of Roxborough, Ontario, preached from Matt XVI: 18, 19. His subject being the true foundation and power of the Christian Church. The attention paid at all the services was excellent, and the order was all that could be desired. The choir rendered valuable assistance with the praise part of the services. Honourable mention was made of the Board of Trustees and Ladies' Aid for their valuable work. The present beautiful condition of the Church reflects great credit on the congregation, and the Guardian predicts an era of great future prosperity for the Belfast congregation. This is undoubtedly one of the most important country congregations in the Maritime Provinces.—Com.
