MR. THOMAS MEAGHER, Pictou, is in the city attending the markets with view to buying beef, veal and chicken for the Pictou market. A quantity was shipped yesterday. The Pictou Standard says: "Last week he killed two head of cattle which were extremely fine, and he wants to keep up his reputation for having on sale the best there is to be had. It is a pity our farmers would not pay more attention to this profitable line of business so that the cash could be kept in our own province."

At the regular meeting of Court Avondale last night a communication was read from the High Court of P. E. Island recommending that the High Court avail itself of the offer of the Trustees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital, as contained in their By-laws to wit: "Free beds may be established by either of the following modes—First, By the annual payment of \$200.00; second, By the payment of \$3,000 at one time as a permanent foundation." Mr. Clark, the H. C. R. thought \$50 of the \$200 might be donated by the High Court, and that a sum equal to one cent per month might be levied, leaving the courts to pay it in any way they choose. The matter will be considered at next meeting of Court Avondale.
