By-Law for allowing a rate of discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general Civic purposes for the Current Year ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D., 1904.

1st., a discount at the rate of 2 1/2% shall be allowed all taxpayers who shall on or before the 25th day of July, next, A. D., 1904 pay to the City Clerk, at his office the taxes severally due by them for the current year on real estate and personal property for Civic purposes.

As I said, reporters are born, not made by studying 'journalism' in the abstract. The natural born reporter is at home in a newspaper office, he can live on ink and can sleep soundly on the imposing stone. He sees little news in a dog biting a man, but he is quick to grasp the importance of an item telling about a man biting a dog."

### A Famous Correspondent.

A man very much talked of lately, on account of his valuable press letters, is Dr. G. B. Morrison, the Peking correspondent of The London Times, and for a man of only forty or so he has certainly had a crowded and adventurous career. He started it, it seems, while a school-boy, by navigating the River Murray from source to mouth in a little canoe by himself. Then he walked from Melbourne to Adelaide, a sort of trial trip preliminary to his great and perilous solitary tramp of two thousand miles across Australia from farthest north to remotest south. This was the beginning of his connection with journalism, as he wrote a vivid narrative of his experiences in the Melbourne Age. Then he worked for a season among the pearl-shell divers of Northwestern Australia, subsequently shipping as an ordinary seaman on a Kanaka recruiting schooner for a voyage among the Pacific Islands, publishing the results in the Age. Next he led the same paper's exploring expedition into New Guinea, where he was speared by a Papuan cannibal. A portion of the spear remained embedded in his body, and was only removed when he went to Edinburgh to qualify for his M.D. degree. Returning to Australia, he was appointed House Surgeon in the Ballarat Hospital, where he remained for two years, when his roving disposition again asserted itself. This time he chose China, and there he appears to have taken root at last.
