GYROSCOPE MAY MAKE AVIATION PERFECTLY SAFE.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., March 26.—In an arm scout aeroplane Lieutenant Harold Geiger and Robert Sperr have made a preliminary flight to test the Sperr Gyroscope which is expected to revolutionize aerial navigation. They were in the air thirty-five minutes, and reported that the trial was successful, although the worth of the gyroscope will not be fully demonstrated until the official government test is made. This will include a deliberate attempt to capsize the biplane while standing over the bay. Robert Sperr is a son of the inventor of the gyroscope, which is expected to make aviation safe by automatically maintaining the equilibrium of airships.

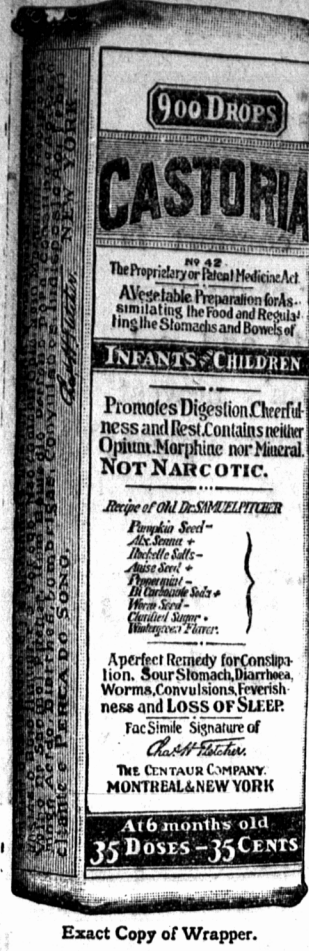

HARVARD STUDENTS ARE KEEPING TALLY. CAMBRIDGE, Mass., March 27.—Copying modern efficiency methods, Harvard students are keeping tally on the way they spend their time. The committee on scholarship desires to determine the relative periods devoted to college activities and to other interests. There is said to be no present intention of "speeding up" the "students' work, but recommendations may be made as to how they might employ themselves more profitably. In cards which have been issued undergraduates are asked to tell how much time is spent in eating, sleeping, studying, athletics, theatres and in all other ways. A careful record is to be kept for one week and the cards then are to be returned to the committee. The result of the canvass is to be published.
