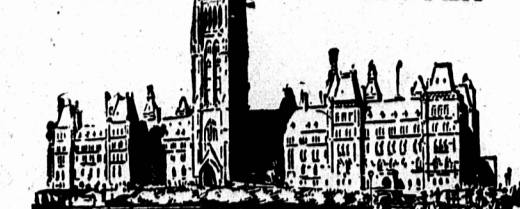

OTTAWA LETTER

Last Wednesday evening I had the pleasure of attending Henry McCulloch's annual lobster dinner. This is the twelfth dinner Henry has put on since he became a member of the House of Commons. He represents Pictou County and has represented that constituency since 1935. These annual lobster dinners are regarded as somewhat of an institution in Ottawa. Over one-hundred guests attend, including Cabinet Ministers, members of the House of Commons, and the Senate, senior civil servants and House of Commons officials. It was the last Wednesday on which the House did not sit for commencing on Wednesday evening of this week the House will sit through until eleven the same as on the other days.

Last year and more particularly the year before considerable difficulty and annoyance were caused both to the department officials and the growers of potatoes due to late applications for inspection. The last day which applications will be received is June 15th. In fact most applications should be in before this. Early applications permit the arrangement of the inspections to the best advantage. Application forms will be sent to all growers whose crops were inspected in 1947, as well as to those who have made a special request for inspection to the local inspector.

I should hope that after the experience of last year and the year before growers desiring inspection would get their applications filed in time.

I had a very pleasant call last week from Fred Skerry, formerly of Lot Eleven, but now of Ottawa. Fred has been sick for the last two years; but I am pleased to note that he is making a rapid recovery and expects to be back to his auditing in a couple of months.

When Parliament opened yesterday very touching tributes were paid to the memory of the late Colonel Ralston. The Prime Minister in his tribute said: "I knew

Colonel Ralston intimately and a more unselfish and self-sacrificing public servant I have never known. I cannot recall anyone of my acquaintances who seemed to be more industrious, more conscientious or more ready to sacrifice everything for duty, as he saw it, than Colonel Ralston." John T. Hackett, K.C., member for Stansstead, President of the Canadian Bar Association concluded his tribute as follows: "He suffered the fortune and the fate of those engaged in the endless adventure of governing men—no more, no less. Ralston understood. He did not complain. He considered it a privilege to have given of his best in field and forum to public service of his country. When this came to an end he returned to his briefs not sad and dejected, but lighthearted and joyous. He had done his duty, he had retained his ideals, he had kept his friends. "To live in the hearts we leave behind "Is not to die."

Today I went to Montreal to attend Colonel Ralston's funeral. A very simple but impressive service was held in the First Baptist Church, the church in which Colonel Ralston worshipped since he first came to Montreal. The church was full of dignitaries from all walks of life who came to pay their last respects to a great soldier, a great statesman and a great jurist. The service was conducted by the Rev. M. P. McCutcheon. The choir and congregation sang two of the late Colonel Ralston's favorite hymns "The Sands of Time are Sinking" and "Lead Kindly Light." As the body left the church the choir intoned the Nunc Dimittis—"Lord now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace."

Tenders Opened For Extension Of Runways At Summerside Airport

OTTAWA, May 27 - (Special) - Tenders for extension of the airport runways at Summerside so as to accommodate any type of plane were opened today by officials of the Canadian Commercial Corporation which makes purchases and negotiates contracts for the Defense Department. It is probable that the contract for both extension and resurfacing of the runways will be let by the end of the current week.

On the other hand, regret was expressed by J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal M. P. for Prince, today over the decision of Defence Minister Brooke Claxton to defer construction of 65 housing units for the R.C.A.F. establishment at Summerside until next year. This project will not be included in the 2,350 houses being built at 36 different locations this year as married quarters for service personnel and defence research. "Building of the 65 units at Summerside is by no means

cancelled," Mr. MacNaught assured The Guardian in the government lobby after Mr. Claxton's announcement of the House construction program for the armed services. "I have the Minister's assurance that building of these units is an integral part of the program at Summerside. It has been found however, that accommodation for R.C.A.F. personnel can be found at Summerside without construction of new accommodation. "However, the Minister informed me that housing was a most urgent necessity in other parts of the country and that building of the housing units in Prince Edward Island would have to be deferred for a year."
