ANTI-HOME RULE FIGHT IS OPENED

LONDON, October 11--The Right Hon. Walter Long, opening the anti-home rule campaign at Darlington, pointed out that self-government upon the lines of Canada and Australia meant virtual separation. Canada tomorrow, if she chose to do so, could throw off her allegiance to the British flag. They know perfectly well that all the soldiers and sailors in the world and all the statesmen could not prevent Canada, Australia and South Africa taking their own line.

These great dominions had no intention of doing anything of the kind, for they love the mother country and meant to stand by her. That was true, but wise people ought not to be content with securities of that kind. In certain circumstances they would regret it with bitter tears if Canada or Australia or the Union of South Africa were to leave the mother country, but it would not interfere with the security of her defenses. But it was so with Ireland? Could they regard the prospect of the separation of Ireland with the same comparative equanimity they do that of the Dominions? Ireland was part of themselves. She was as much a part of the mother country as Lancashire or Yorkshire or Durham.

CRIPPLED 14 YEARS, VISITS SHRINE, WALKS.

LONDON, Oct. 11--Miss Mary Margiotta suffered from spinal meningitis fourteen years, was bedridden two years and underwent eleven surgical operations. She accompanied the Roman Catholic pilgrimage to the grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes, France. Leaving here Sept. 26 last, Miss Margiotta, twenty-nine years of age, had to be carried, almost literally, on the journey.

She had returned and she can walk. Many persons have visited the young woman, including some physicians, but they assert, it is an instance of auto suggestion; there is nothing miraculous about the cure, they say.

"We regard Miss Margiotta's cure as one of the most wonderful that has happened on any of our visits to the shrine," says the priest whom she accompanied on the pilgrimage. "At twenty minutes past midnight Saturday last she expressed the wish to lean over the rails of the shrine. So she was moved to the place she indicated, and she began to pray.

"Suddenly she said she was better, and within a few hours she was walking about like any person in ordinary health. She walked slowly, of course, because she could not believe that her limbs, after being crippled for years, had recovered their freedom of movement.

"We cannot tell for six months whether she is cured permanently, but her condition continued to improve."

"BRITISH COLONIES ARE AGAINST FREE TRADE"

HADDINGTON, Scotland, Oct. 11--A. J. Balfour fired the first gun in Conservative opposition to what may be termed the second act of "The Revolution" before an immense meeting of the Unionist Association this afternoon. Strong factional opposition to his leadership, which was kindled by his advice to the Lords to accept the Veto bill, has accused him particularly of weakness on the tariff reform issue and his announcement on this point was important. He came out strongly for imperial preference.

"I hope," said Mr. Balfour, "that our people will find the spirit in which we must approach this question in the broad decision reached by the Canadian people. The Canadian decision extended far beyond the borders of Canada and must have beneficial results for the Empire at large. The decision of Canada shows how impossible it is to maintain the present system of things.

"Our colonies are not believers in the system spoken of as free trade. Unless this country meets the situation we will have Canada, Australia, New Zealand and other great communities making their separate commercial tariffs with other countries. This country will awake some fine morning to find that these great communities, loyal as they are, have instituted a system of tariffs in which we will find ourselves at a disadvantage. Such a state of affairs must have a fatal effect upon the unity of the British Empire."

John Hedmond, speaking tonight at Manchester, said that the main principle at stake is purely that the Irish in local affairs shall have the largest measure of self-government consistent with the integrity of the empire, and the supremacy of the imperial Parliament.

"We do not ask for the repeal of the union," said he. "We accept your supremacy—not merely accept it but invite you to make it as effective as you like."
